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## About this document

This document supports z/OS (5694-A01).

This documents the messages issued by the JES2 element of z/OS.

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## Who should use this document

This document should be used by operators, system or application programmers, or by anyone who is responsible for controlling or diagnosing problems in JES2.

---

## How to use this document

The messages in this document are organized in sections: Each contains messages in a 100-number range. The documentation for each message includes:

- Message identifier and message text
- An explanation of the message
- A description of the action taken by JES2 after issuing the message.

The documentation for a message may also include any of the following:

- Operator response
- User response
- Application programmer response
- System programmer response.

---

## Using LookAt to look up message explanations

LookAt is an online facility that lets you look up explanations for most of the IBM® messages you encounter, as well as for some system abends and codes. Using LookAt to find information is faster than a conventional search because in most cases LookAt goes directly to the message explanation.

You can use LookAt from these locations to find IBM message explanations for z/OS® elements and features, z/VM®, z/VSE™, and Clusters for AIX® and Linux™:

- The Internet. You can access IBM message explanations directly from the LookAt Web site at [www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/bkserv/lookat/](http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/bkserv/lookat/).
- Your z/OS TSO/E host system. You can install code on your z/OS systems to access IBM message explanations using LookAt from a TSO/E command line (for example: TSO/E prompt, ISPF, or z/OS UNIX® System Services).
- Your Microsoft® Windows® workstation. You can install LookAt directly from the *z/OS Collection* (SK3T-4269) or the *z/OS and Software Products DVD Collection* (SK3T-4271) and use it from the resulting Windows graphical user interface (GUI). The command prompt (also known as the DOS > command line) version can still be used from the directory in which you install the Windows version of LookAt.
- Your wireless handheld device. You can use the LookAt Mobile Edition from [www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/bkserv/lookat/lookatm.html](http://www.ibm.com/servers/eserver/zseries/zos/bkserv/lookat/lookatm.html) with a handheld device that has wireless access and an Internet browser (for example: Internet Explorer for Pocket PCs, Blazer or Eudora for Palm OS, or Opera for Linux handheld devices).

You can obtain code to install LookAt on your host system or Microsoft Windows workstation from:

## Using IBM Health Checker for z/OS

IBM Health Checker for z/OS is a z/OS component that installations can use to gather information about their system environment and system parameters to help identify potential configuration problems before they impact availability or cause outages. Individual products, z/OS components, or ISV software can provide checks that take advantage of the IBM Health Checker for z/OS framework. This book might refer to checks or messages associated with this component.

For additional information about checks and about IBM Health Checker for z/OS, see *IBM Health Checker for z/OS: User's Guide*.

SDSF also provides functions to simplify the management of checks. See *z/OS SDSF Operation and Customization* for additional information.

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## How Messages are Explained in this Book

The following describes the different parts of message explanations in this book:

### Explanation

The meaning of the message, including why the system issued the message.

### System Action

- What the system did as a result of the system condition reported by the message. A system condition could include running out of storage, a hardware or software failure, an abend, a wait state.
- What the system did as a result of user input. User input can include a system command, a job running on the system, a transaction, a query, or another user-system interaction.

### Operator Response

Instructions for the system operator, including, as appropriate, decisions to make and actions to take.

Only provided for messages that could appear at the operator console.

### User Response

Instructions for the end user.

Only provided for messages that could appear at an interactive interface such as a TSO/E terminal or ISPF application.

**Note:** Most user messages are explained in other message books, such as *z/OS TSO/E Messages*.

### Application Programmer Response

Instructions for an application programmer.

Only provided for messages that could appear in SYSOUT produced by a job, for example SPZAP.

### System Programmer Response

Instructions for the system programmer.

Only provided for messages that require additional action beyond the operator response, user response, or application programmer response.

### Storage Administrator Response

Instructions for the DFSMSdfp storage administrator.

## Security Administrator Response

Instructions for the security administrator.

Only provided for security-related messages.

## Problem Determination

Additional instructions for determining the cause of the problem, searching problem databases, and, if necessary, reporting the problem to the IBM support center. These instructions are for a customer support person who can troubleshoot problems, such as the system programmer or system administrator, an experienced security administrator, or an experienced storage administrator.

For additional information on performing problem determination procedures, see *z/OS Problem Management* and the appropriate diagnosis guide for the product or element issuing the message, such as:

- DFSMS/MVS diagnosis guides and references
- *z/OS JES2 Diagnosis*
- *z/OS JES3 Diagnosis*

## Source

Element, product, or component that issued the message.

## Detecting Module

Name of the module or modules that detected the condition that caused the message to be issued.

## Routing Code

For WTO or WTOR messages, the routing code of the message.

## Descriptor Code

For WTO or WTOR messages, the descriptor code of the message.

## Chapter 1. Introduction

z/OS issues messages from JES2 to different locations in the following ways:

- Through the WTO and WTOR macros to operator consoles, the hard-copy log, a SYSOUT data set, or the job log for the job's system output message class. Routing codes determine where (such as the system log (SYSLOG)) the messages are to be displayed or printed.

Message routing codes provide the ability to route system operator messages to the locations where they are needed. The routing codes indicate the functional areas to which a message is to be sent. More than one routing code may be assigned to a message to send it to more than one console.

Message descriptor codes identify the type of message being written so that individual console support may determine how to handle the message. Specifically, this type of code determines how the system will display and delete the message.

- Through the WTL macro or the operator LOG command to the system log (SYSLOG).
- Through the access methods directly to an output data set or a display terminal.

---

### System log

The system log (SYSLOG) is a SYSOUT data set provided by JES2. SYSOUT data sets are output spool data sets on direct access storage devices (DASD). Your installation should print the SYSLOG periodically. The SYSLOG consists of:

- All messages from WTL macros
- All messages entered by operator LOG commands
- Typically the hard-copy log
- Any messages routed to the SYSLOG from any system component or program.

---

### Hard-copy log

The hard-copy log is a record of all system message traffic and written to SYSLOG.

---

### JES2 message format

JES2 messages appear on a display console or system log in the following format:

```
[hh.mm.ss] [sysname] {jobid} {@    } {Nn Mm} $HASPnnnn text           {*    }
                                                                {b[+]}
```

#### hh.mm.ss

The time stamp shows the time the message was issued in hours, minutes, and seconds. This display is optional and appears before the message identifier (\$HASPnnnn) if your installation has entered the CONTROL (K S,MFORM=(T)) command to include the time stamp in the console message format.

#### sysname

The system name. This display is optional and appears before the message identifier (\$HASPnnnn) if your installation has entered the CONTROL (K S,MFORM=(S)) command to include the system name in the console message format.

#### jobid

JES2 job identifier. This display is optional, and it appears before a subset of message identifiers (\$HASPnnnn) if your installation has entered the CONTROL (K S,MFORM=(J)) command to include the job identifier in the console message format. See Table 1 on page 2 for a list of the subset of messages preceded by a job identifier.

**Nn Mm**

The number of the node (Nn) and the multi-access spool (MAS) member (Mm).

- \* Indicates a request for operator action.
- @ Indicates a request for operator action by JES2 generation modules or the remote workstation generation program (RMTGEN).
- b Blank, if no operator action is required.
- + Indicates the message is issued by JES2 generation or RMTGEN; no action is required.

**\$HASP**

All messages in this document are documented with the \$HASP prefix. The dollar sign (\$) is the console character defined by JES2. All JES2 messages will be preceded by \$HASP unless your installation changes the dollar sign to another character using the CONDEF CONCHAR initialization statement, the \$T CONDEF CONCHAR command, or supply the CONDEF CONCHAR statement from the console during initialization.

**nnn**

3 or 4 digit message serial number.

**text**

Message text.

**Messages preceded by a job identifier**

The following table identifies the JES2 messages that have a job identifier (JOBxxxxx or Jxxxxxx followed by a job number) if the installation has entered the CONTROL (K S,MFORM=(J)) command to include the job identifier in the message format.

**Multiple-line JES2 messages**

JES2 presents information in both single-line and multiple-line format. The format of multiple-line messages is different from that of single-line messages. A multiple-line message consists of:

1. A control line containing:
  - The message identifier
  - An indication of the information in the following data lines
  - A three-digit decimal connect identification number, which varies.

2. Two or more data lines. The number of lines varies with the amount of information displayed.

The following figure is an example of a multiple-line message.

```
$HASP826 NODE(1) 239
$HASP826 NODE(1) NAME=POK,STATUS=OWNNODE,
$HASP826 AUTH=(DEVICE=NO,JOB=YES,NET=NO,

If JES2 is responding to a request for information about a range of devices that requires multiple lines, a multiple-line message will be issued for each device. For example, \$D NODE(1-3) causes JES2 to display three multiple-line messages: one each for node 1, 2, and 3.

If a message that JES2 issues as a multiple-line message does not contain enough information to span more than one line, JES2 issues that message in single-line format. This occurs when:

- JES2 uses the message to display information for various devices that do not contain enough information to create more than a single line of message data.
- JES2 responds to a command that limits the information for a device to a single line. For example, by entering the \$D NODE(POK),STATUS command, the following single-line message is issued:

```
$HASP826 NODE(3) STATUS=(PENDING/POK)
```

When automating messages, it is recommended that your automation program determine how many lines are contained in the message. If there is more than one line, your automation program should process the first line as the control line of a multiple-line message. Table 2 lists the message identifiers for the messages that JES2 issues as multiple-line messages.

JES2 cannot issue some of the messages listed in single-line format.

## A Method for Finding Changes to MVS and TSO/E Message Texts

Automation routines are sensitive to changes to message text between releases. You can find changes to message texts in the following ways:

- The Summary of Changes of the related messages book can be helpful when you go from one release to the next.
- Data set SYS1.MSGENU contains data that can help you identify changes to message texts more accurately. This method allows you to find message text changes between your current release and whatever release you choose to migrate to. This method is described below.

### Using SYS1.MSGENU to Find Message Text Changes

IBM supplies a data set containing the text of system messages that are translated. This data set, called SYS1.MSGENU, contains the text of system messages in the form of message skeletons. (For more information, see *z/OS MVS Planning: Operations*.)

Note that this method will not show changes to:

- MVS system messages that are not translated, such as IPL and NIP messages (which are issued before the MVS message service is available)
- Other product messages that are not translated, such as DFSMS/MVS messages, and JES3 messages.
- For JES2 messages, use the appropriate SYS1.SHASMENU data set.

Also, this method works better if the “old” copy of SYS1.SHASMENU has the same level of service as the system from which you are migrating.

You can compare the new data set with the data set on the system from which you are migrating. Depending on how you do the comparison, you can get output like the following.

For new messages, the output might show an I (for Insert) on the left:

```
I - IEA403I      VALUE OF RMAX HAS BEEN CHANGED TO 99
```

For messages whose text has changed, the output might show both an I and a D, indicating that a record in the message file has been replaced:

```
I - IEE162I 46  &NNN. ROLL &A. MESSAGES (DEL=R OR RD)
D - IEE162I 46  &NNN. ROLL &A. MESSAGES (DEL=R, RD)
```

This means that, in message IEE162I, (DEL=R, RD) was replaced by (DEL=R OR RD).

Using this information, you can decide if your automation routines need to be changed.

---

## JES2 message documentation

Some messages have optional fields in the text; these are fields that appear in the messages only under certain circumstances. In this document, optional fields are shown enclosed in brackets:

```
$HASPnnn message text [optional field]
```

Some messages have alternative fields; that is, under certain circumstances one field will appear, and under other circumstances another field will appear. One of the alternative fields appear when the message appears on your console. In this document, alternative fields are shown stacked one above the other, enclosed in braces:

```
$HASPnnn message text {first alternative }
                        {second alternative}
```

Each message description includes the following sections:

### **\$HASPnnn message text**

Message identifier and text.

**Explanation**

Explains why the message was issued.

**System Action**

Explains the action JES2 takes.

**Operator Response**

Describes any actions the operator should take to correct the problem. (This section is omitted if there is no operator action necessary.)

**Application Programmer Response**

Describes any actions the application programmer should take to correct the problem. (This section is omitted if there is no application programmer action necessary.)

**User Response**

Describes any action the user should take to correct the problem, such as resubmitting a job. (This section is omitted if there is no user action necessary.)

**System Programmer Response**

Describes any actions system programmer should take to correct the problem. (This section is omitted if there is no system programmer action necessary.)



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## Chapter 2. Routing codes

Routing codes send system messages to the consoles where they are to be displayed. More than one routing code can be assigned to a message to send it to more than one console. For more information on message routing, see the following documents:

- *z/OS MVS Programming: Authorized Assembler Services Guide*
- *z/OS MVS Programming: Authorized Assembler Services Reference SET-WTO*
- *z/OS MVS Installation Exits*
- *z/OS MVS Initialization and Tuning Reference*

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### Specification

The routing codes are specified in the ROUTCDE parameter of the WTO or WTOR macro. If you specify a message which contains no routing codes, MVS may provide one or more default routing codes, based upon the presence or lack of other queuing specifications.

If you specify a message containing descriptor codes but no routing codes and no target console, MVS will not assign any routing codes but will attempt to queue the message to the console with master authority.

If you specify a message containing no routing codes, no descriptor codes, and no target console, MVS will assign a default set of routing codes. This set of default routing codes is specified at MVS initialization on the DEFAULT statement in your CONSOLxx parmlib member. If a set of default routing codes was not provided on the DEFAULT statement, MVS will assign routing codes 1 through 6.

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### Routing code meaning

Code	Meaning
<b>1</b>	<b>Operator Action</b> The message indicates a change in the system status. It demands action by the operator at the console with master authority.
<b>2</b>	<b>Operator Information</b> The message indicates a change in system status. It does not demand action; rather, it alerts the operator at the console with master authority to a condition that might require action. This routing code is used for any message that indicates job status when the status is not requested specifically by an operator inquiry. It is also used to route processor and problem program messages to the system operator.
<b>3</b>	<b>Tape Pool</b> The message gives information about tape devices, such as the status of a tape unit or reel, the disposition of a tape reel, or a request to mount a tape.
<b>4</b>	<b>Direct Access Pool</b> The message gives information about direct access storage devices (DASD), such as the status of a direct access unit or volume, the disposition of a volume, or a request to mount a volume.
<b>5</b>	<b>Tape Library</b> The message gives tape library information, such as a request by volume serial numbers for tapes for system or problem program use.

<b>6</b>	<b>Disk Library</b>	The message gives disk library information, such as a request by volume serial numbers for volumes for system or problem program use.
<b>7</b>	<b>Unit Record Pool</b>	The message gives information about unit record equipment, such as a request to mount a printer train.
<b>8</b>	<b>Teleprocessing Control</b>	The message gives the status or disposition of teleprocessing equipment, such as a message that describes line errors.
<b>9</b>	<b>System Security</b>	The message gives information about security checking, such as a request for a password.
<b>10</b>	<b>System/Error Maintenance</b>	The message gives problem information for the system programmer, such as a system error, an uncorrectable I/O error, or information about system maintenance.
<b>11</b>	<b>Programmer Information</b>	The message is intended for the problem programmer. This routing code is used when the program issuing the message cannot route the message to the programmer through a system output (SYSOUT) data set. The message appears in the job log.
<b>12</b>	<b>Emulation</b>	The message gives information about emulation. (These message identifiers are not included in this document.)
<b>13-20</b>		For customer use only.
<b>21-28</b>		For subsystem use only.
<b>29</b>		For disaster recovery.
<b>30-40</b>		For IBM use only.
<b>41</b>		The message gives information about JES3 job status.
<b>42</b>		The message gives general information about JES2 or JES3.
<b>43-64</b>		For JES use only.
<b>65-96</b>		Messages associated with particular processors.
<b>97-128</b>		Messages associated with particular devices.

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## Routing codes in this document

Routing codes appear to the right of the message identifiers in the **Routing Code** column. The column can also contain the following special characters or notes:

- \* The message will be routed back to the consoles that initiated the associated requests.
- / The message will be routed to different locations according to the task issuing it. For example, \*/2/3 means the message is routed back to the console that initiated the request, to the console with master authority, or to the tape pool.
- # The message will be routed in one of the following ways:
  - According to the routing indicators specified by the operator
  - According to the default routing instructions previously specified by the operator



- Back to the console that initiated the associated request
- The message has no routing code.
- Note 2** The message is issued by a WTO or WTOR macro, but has no routing or descriptor codes (old format WTO or WTOR macro).
- Note 3** The message has a routing code of 1, which sends it to the console with master authority, and is also routed to the console that the message describes.
- Note 4** The message is sent to all active consoles; this is a broadcast message.
- Note 5** The message has a routing code of 2, which sends it to the console with master authority, and is also routed to the consoles that are assuming the duties of the failing console. (This message indicates that console switching has occurred.)
- Note 6** The message is routed only to non-printer consoles. This message is not issued by a WTO or WTOR macro.
- Note 7** The message is routed to consoles where one or more of the following are active:
- MONITOR JOB NAMES
  - MONITOR SESSIONS
  - MONITOR STATUS
- Note 8** The message is also routed to the MSS space manager's console specified by an alternate console routing code on the MSFMSG parameter in the MVIKEY00 parmlib member.
- Note 9** The message is issued during the nucleus initialization program (NIP) processing.
- Note 10** The message is issued by the WTL macro.
- Note 11** The message is routed to a SYS PRINT data set by data management.
- Note 12** The message is issued by a WTO or WTOR macro with SYNCH=YES. See *z/OS MVS Initialization and Tuning Reference* for more information.
- Note 13** The message is routed only to receivers of the hardcopy message set.
- Note 14** The message is routed back to the console that initiated the request and to all associated consoles.
- Note 16** The message is routed to the IPCS print file IPCSPRNT.
- Note 17** The message is issued by JES3. A JES3 destination class is specified either by the initialization stream or by operator commands.
- Note 18** The message is sent in response to a command to the console where the command was entered.
- Note 19** The message is written to a data set. If routing and descriptor codes are also included for the message, the message might also be displayed according to the specified routing and descriptor codes. (The descriptor code does not apply to writing the message to the data set.)
- Note 20** JES3 does not issue the message. JES3 sends the message to another subsystem for processing.
- Note 21** This message is a trailer attached to multiple messages previously issued. It has the same routing and descriptor codes as the first line of the conglomerate.
- Note 22** This message is routed to the transaction program (TP) message log.
- Note 23** This message is issued by the device controller. The routing code will vary according to the device controller's task.
- Note 24** This message is routed to the assembly listing.

- Note 25** When this message is issued during IPL, the routing codes are 2 and 10 and the descriptor code is 12. When it is issued after IPL, it has no routing code and the descriptor code is 5.
- Note 26** When this message is issued during NIP processing, the descriptor code is 12. When it is issued after NIP processing, the descriptor code is 4.
- Note 27** The indicated route codes are used only if this message is issued in response to a reply of CKPTDEF during a JES2 checkpoint reconfiguration. This message might be issued to a specific console ID rather than directed by route code. For further information concerning the routing of JES2 messages issued during a reconfiguration, see *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Guide*.
- Note 28** These routing and descriptor codes apply only when SMS issues the message. If SMS returns the message to its caller and the caller issues the message, the codes do not apply.
- Note 29** This message is written to the JES3OUT data set.
- Note 30** This message is issued by JES3. The message is written to the \*MODIFY CONFIG (\*F MODIFY) log, the issuer of the \*F CONFIG command, or both.

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## Chapter 3. Descriptor codes

Descriptor codes describe the significance of messages. They indicate whether the system or a task stops processing, waits until some action is completed, or continues. This code also determines how the system will display and delete the message.

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### Association with message type code

Descriptor codes are associated with message type codes, specified by a letter following the message serial number, as follows:

Descriptor Code	Type Code
1	W (wait)
2	A (action) or D (decision)
3	E (eventual action)
4 through 10	I (information)
11	E (eventual action)
12 and 13	I (information)

---

### Specification

Descriptor codes are specified in the DESC parameter of the WTO or WTOR macro. The following restrictions apply when specifying descriptor codes:

- Descriptor codes 1 through 6, 11, and 12 are mutually exclusive. Assign only one of these codes to a message. If you assign two mutually exclusive codes to one message, the system uses the most important code and ignores the other.
- Descriptor codes 7 through 10 and 13 can be assigned in combination with any of the mutually exclusive codes.
- Descriptor code 9 or 10 can be used only with descriptor code 8.

Under certain conditions, the system uses a descriptor code other than that specified in the macro as follows:

- The system assigns descriptor code 6 if the macro specifies a ROUTCDE parameter, but no DESC parameter.
- The system assigns descriptor code 7 if all of the following are true:
  1. A problem program issued the macro.
  2. The macro omits both DESC and ROUTCDE parameters, or specifies descriptor codes 1 or 2.
  3. The message is not a multiple-line WTO message.
- The system assigns no descriptor code if all of the following are true:
  1. An authorized program issued the macro.
  2. The macro omits both DESC and ROUTCDE parameters.
  3. The message is not a multiple-line WTO message.

**Note:** An authorized program has at least one of these characteristics:

- Authorized by the authorized program facility (APF)
- Runs in supervisor state
- Runs under PSW key 0 through 7

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## Message deletion

With multiple console support (MCS), action messages with descriptor code 1 or 2 issued by problem programs are assigned descriptor code 7; thus, they are automatically deleted from the system at task or address space ending.

The system deletes messages issued by any program when that program issues the DOM macro.

The operator can manually remove all messages from a display console screen or can set the console to roll messages off the screen.

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## Message color

On operator consoles with color, the descriptor code determines the color of the message. The use of color is explained in *z/OS MVS System Commands*. Also see the descriptions of the CONSOLxx and MPFLSTxx parmlib members in *z/OS MVS Initialization and Tuning Reference*.

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## Descriptor code meaning

Code	Meaning
1	<b>System Failure</b> The message indicates an error that disrupts system operations. To continue, the operator must reIPL the system or restart a major subsystem. This causes the audible alarm to be issued.
2	<b>Immediate Action Required</b> The message indicates that the operator must perform an action immediately. The message issuer could be in a wait state until the action is performed or the system needs the action as soon as possible to improve performance. The task waits for the operator to complete the action. This causes the audible alarm to be issued.  <b>Note:</b> When an authorized program issues a message with descriptor code 2, a DOM macro <i>must</i> be issued to delete the message after the requested action is performed.
3	<b>Eventual Action Required</b> The message indicates that the operator must perform an action eventually. The task does not wait for the operator to complete the action.  If the task can determine when the operator has performed the action, the task should issue a DOM macro to delete the message when the action is complete.
4	<b>System Status</b> The message indicates the status of a system task or of a hardware unit.
5	<b>Immediate Command Response</b> The message is issued as an immediate response to a system command. The response does not depend on another system action or task.
6	<b>Job Status</b> The message indicates the status of a job or job step.
7	<b>Task-Related</b> The message is issued by an application or system program. Messages with this descriptor code are deleted when the job step that issued them ends.

	The message appears in hardcopy before being queued to a console.
<b>8</b>	<b>Out-of-Line</b> The message, which is one line of a group of one or more lines, is to be displayed out-of-line. If a message cannot be printed out-of-line because of the device being used, descriptor code 8 is ignored, and the message is printed in-line with the other messages.
<b>9</b>	<b>Operator's Request</b> The message is written in response to an operator's request for information by a DEVSERV, DISPLAY, TRACK, or MONITOR command.
<b>10</b>	<b>TRACK Command Response</b> The message is issued in response to a TRACK command.
<b>11</b>	<b>Critical Eventual Action Required</b> The message indicates that the operator must perform an action eventually, and the action is important enough for the message to remain on the display screen until the action is completed. The task does not wait for the operator to complete the action. This causes the audible alarm to be issued.  Avoid using this descriptor code for non-critical messages because the display screen could become filled.  If the task can determine when the operator has performed the action, the task should issue a DOM macro to delete the message when the action is complete.
<b>12</b>	<b>Important Information</b> The message contains important information that must be displayed at a console, but does not require any action in response.
<b>13</b>	<b>Automation Information</b> Indicates that this message was previously automated.
<b>14-16</b>	Reserved for future use.

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## Descriptor codes in this document

The descriptor codes appear in the **Descriptor Code** column. The column can also contain the following special characters.

- / The message will have different descriptor codes according to the task issuing it. For example, 4/6 means the message can describe system status or job status.
- The message has no descriptor code.



## Chapter 4. Zero to ninety-nine

### \$HASP000

#### Explanation:

►►—OK—

The command has been accepted for action. The appropriate action has been taken or has been scheduled. The OK response is an indication that the JES2 command processor found no fault in the command; however, actions such as an attempt to initiate a function already scheduled or in progress may be ignored.

**System action:** The system continues processing.

**Operator response:** None.

**Detecting Module:** HASPCOMM

**Routing Code:** #

**Descriptor Code:** –

### \$HASP001

#### Explanation:

►►—*con\_name*, *text*—

The operator at console *con\_name* has entered the displayed message, using the display message (\$DM) command.

In the message text: *con\_name* is either:

**Rnnnnnnn**

The number of a remote terminal.

**vvvvvvvv**

The 2- to 8-character console name of a central console.

**System action:** The system continues processing.

**Operator response:** Perform the appropriate action in accordance with installation procedures.

**Detecting Module:** HASPCOMM

**Routing Code:** 8

**Descriptor Code:** 4

### \$HASP003

#### Explanation:

►►—RC=—*rsnc*,

—*trace-of-keywords*—

►—*text*—

►—————  
| ERROR BUILDING MESSAGE HASP—*nnn*—|

During \$SCAN processing, the \$SCAN facility detected one of the following conditions:

- A JES2 operator command was entered in error.
- A JES2 initialization statement was entered in error.
- An error occurred while JES2 was trying to issue a message with the \$BLDMSG service.

In the message text:

*trace-of-keywords*

This lists the command verb (VERB from the \$SCAN call) and list of keywords being scanned when the error occurs. For example, the command \$ADD NETSERV(1),TRACE=ALWAYS will result in a \$HASP003 RC=(03),ADD NETSERV2 TRACE ALWAYS - INVALID PARAMETER STATEMENT, where ADD is the verb and NETSERV, TRACE and ALWAYS are the operands where the error was detected.

If the \$HASP003 message is being issued because of an error building a message, the trace-of-keywords will be the number (nnnn) of the message being constructed.

The reason code (*rsnc*) and variable message *text* define the reason for the error:

*rsnc*    *text*

#### 01    INVALID SYNTAX

The syntax of the specified keyword is incorrect.

#### 03    INVALID PARAMETER STATEMENT

JES2 does not recognize the specified keyword.

#### 04    CONTAINS AN INVALID SUBSCRIPT[, RANGE IS (xxxx-yyyy)]

The specified subscript value is either outside the allowable range or is not defined by your installation. The valid range of the subscript is displayed. This code can also be displayed if a subscript should have been specified but was not.

#### 05    TOO MANY VALUES WERE SPECIFIED

More values were provided for the keyword than are allowed.

#### 06    VALUE CONTAINS INVALID DATA

## \$HASP003

The value specified for the keyword is in an incorrect character set.

### 07 INVALID JOB TYPE

The job type specified for the keyword is incorrect. For offload SYSOUT receivers/transmitters and print/punch devices, the valid job types are J, S, and T. For offload job receivers/transmitters, the only valid job type is J.

### 08 VALUE IS OUTSIDE NUMERICAL RANGE, RANGE IS (xxxx—yyyy)

The value specified for the keyword is not within the specified range.

### 09 DATA IS TOO SHORT

The number of characters entered is insufficient for the value of the specified keyword.

### 10 DATA IS TOO LONG

Too many characters were entered for the value of the specified keyword.

### 11 TOO MANY {REMOTE | NETWORK RECEIVER | NETWORK XMITTER} DEVICES HAVE BEEN DEFINED

The specified device exceeds the maximum number allowed.

### 12 MISSING REQUIRED OPERAND xxxxxxxx

The variable field xxxxxxxx is optional. When present, it indicates the required operand that is missing for the specified keyword.

### 13 VALUE CAN NOT BE DISPLAYED – TOO LARGE

A request to display a specified keyword value cannot be granted because the area used for display processing is too small. An error has occurred in \$SCAN processing. Determine if it's either an installation exit or an IBM \$SCAN error. If it is an internal JES2 error, contact the IBM support center.

### 14 TOO MANY *keyword type* WERE PROVIDED

The specified keyword is ignored because too many have been provided for this keyword type. You have exceeded the maximum number of specified items that have been defined for your system. If this is a subscript value, you have exceeded the valid number of subscripts on the command.

### 17 INVALID DESTINATION

The value specified for the destination **must** be for a node (Nnnnn), a remote workstation (Rnnnn), a remote work station on another

node (NnnnnRnnnn), a special local (Unnnn), or a local (LOCAL) destination.

This message will be issued during initialization:

- if the symbolic node name has not yet been defined to JES2 (either the NODE statement defining the symbolic node name is missing from the initialization stream or JES has not yet processed the NODE statement in the initialization stream).
- if JES2 detected a DESTID(xxxxxxxx) subscript value that matched a NODE NAME= specification within the initialization data set. (JES2 does not allow you to specify functionally redundant DESTID statements in the initialization data set.)

The problem is either that the sequence of the node definition in the initialization stream is not correct or the initialization stream defines a duplicate node. Correct the initialization stream.

If you ignore this error message when a DESTID subscript value matches a NODE NAME specification and proceed with initialization, JES2 will initialize, but is unable to communicate with the duplicated node as specified by *trace-of-keywords*. This means that anything you direct to the duplicated node, such as output or commands, might arrive at an unexpected destination.

### 18 INVALID ROUTE CODE

In general the valid route codes for a device are to a node (Nnnnn), a remote workstation (Rnnnn or R\*), a remote workstation on a different node (NnnnnRnnnn or NnnnnR\*), a special local (Unnnn) or a local (LOCAL). See the description of the specific device in *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Reference* for a list of the valid route codes.

### 19 INVALID ACCOUNT INFORMATION

The specified low range of the account information is greater than the specified high range of the account information.

### 21 INVALID REMOTE DEVICE NAME

The specified remote device has not been defined to JES2 with an RMTnnnn initialization statement because it was issued locally, and JES2 could not determine the remote device name. For example, if not issued from a remote, issue the fully qualified command \$D R(nnnn).PU(m).

### 22 VALUE CAN NOT BE DISPLAYED – NOT YET SPECIFIED



- A request was made to display a keyword that has not been specified.
- 23 INVALID COMMENT FOUND**
- An incorrect comment was found. Either it does not have the proper delimiters (*/\* comment \*/*) or its location is not legal. See *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Reference* or *z/OS JES2 Commands* for valid syntax.
- 24 REQUEST DENIED – INSUFFICIENT STORAGE**
- The request is denied because there is insufficient storage to satisfy it. Increase the JES2 region size or increase the private storage area above 16 megabytes in virtual storage.
- 25 NO SELECTABLE DEVICE(S) FOUND**
- A request to set, display, or act upon (for example, \$P) a device or range of devices cannot be satisfied. Either JES2 could not find a device or the device it found was not in the range, didn't match the filter, or is in a state that could not be operated on.
- 26 REQUEST DENIED – INTERNAL ERROR WITHIN \$SCAN**
- An abend occurred within JES2 \$SCAN processing, causing the request to end. See previous \$HASP088 or \$HASP095 message. An attempt has been made to return the storage obtained for the processing of the request and JES2 has recovered from the error.
- 27 REQUEST DENIED – INTERNAL ERROR WITHIN \$SCAN**
- Insufficient information passed to the JES2 \$SCAN routine has caused the request to end abnormally. This error could also be due to a \$SCANTAB macro coding error. Determine if it's either an installation exit or an IBM \$SCANTAB error. If an internal JES2 error, contact the IBM support center. \$SCAN requires:
- A valid call (see the macro \$SCAN)
  - Specification of a display output area with a valid length
  - Specification of a display routine
  - A parameter statement for the highest level of scanning passed to it
  - A set of tables passed to it.
- 28 REQUIRED CONTROL BLOCK(S) NOT (YET) AVAILABLE**
- The requested control block(s) could not be found. While progressing through a chain of control blocks, JES2 encountered a pointer of zero. It is possible that an attempt to display fields in a control block was made before the set request to build the control block. Contact the IBM support center.
- 31 MODULE COULD NOT BE LOADED**
- The specified module cannot be loaded. See message \$HASP875, RC=02 for more information.
- 32 MODULE IS INVALID, RMODE MUST BE 24**
- The module is in RMODE 31; JES2 expects it to be in RMODE 24. See message \$HASP875, RC=06 for more information.
- 33 MODULE NAME DOES NOT MATCH ITS MIT, EXPECTED-mit\_exp ACTUAL-mit\_act**
- The module name does not match the label specified on the \$MODULE macro. See message \$HASP875, RC=07 for more information. *z/OS JES2 Macros* provides a description of the \$MODULE macro.
- 34 MODULE VERSION IS INVALID, EXPECTED-ver\_exp ACTUAL-ver\_act**
- The module version in the module's module information table (MIT) does not match that in \$HCT. See message \$HASP875, RC=08 for more information.
- 35 MODULE ASSEMBLED WITH INVALID MACRO LIBRARIES, EXPECTED-lib\_exp ACTUAL-lib\_act**
- The module was assembled with a different set of macro libraries than the rest of the modules in JES2. See message \$HASP875, RC=09 for more information.
- 36 MODULE IS NOT IN COMMON STORAGE**
- The module is not in common storage. See message \$HASP875, RC=10 for more information.
- 37 INSUFFICIENT STORAGE FOR LOAD MODULE TABLE ENTRY**
- The amount of storage needed to allocate the load module table entry for the module was unavailable. See message \$HASP875, RC=01 for more information.
- 38 MODULE MIT IS INVALID, CANNOT LOCATE LMT**
- MODULE MIT IS INVALID, MODULE TOO SMALL**
- MODULE MIT IS INVALID, INCORRECT MITETBL ADDRESS**
- MODULE MIT IS INVALID, INCORRECT EYECATCHER, EXPECTED-MIT ACTUAL-mit**

The module information table (MIT) for this module is incorrect. See message \$HASP875, RC=11 for more information.

**39 INCOMPATIBLE OPERAND SETTINGS –  
XXXXXXXX XXXXXXXX**

The values specified for the displayed operands are not compatible. See *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Reference* or *z/OS JES2 Commands* for incompatibilities.

**40 MULTI-LINE OUTPUT FROM MESSAGE  
BUILDING (\$BLDMSG) INVALID FOR WTOR**

A request to create a message using \$BLDMSG TYPE=WTOR has resulted in an attempt to send more than one line of output to MCS. Because MCS does not accept multi-line WTORs, the request is rejected. However, the first line of the multi-line WTOR is written to the console and all other lines are suppressed. Shorten the message by modifying the \$SCANTAB entries that define that message. See the description of the \$SCANTAB macro in *z/OS JES2 Macros* for information on how to modify these entries. Determine if it's either an installation exit or an IBM \$SCANTAB error. If an installation exit, notify the system programmer. If an internal JES2 error, contact the IBM support center.

**41 SPIN NOT VALID IF TRACE LOG NOT  
ACTIVE**

A request was made to spin the trace log data set when trace logging was not active.

**43 MAXIMUM TRACE STORAGE EXCEEDED  
(NUMBER OF TABLES TIMES PAGES PER  
TABLE)**

The total amount of storage requested for trace tables (number of tables times pages per table) exceeds the maximum of 10 megabytes.

**44 IGNORED, IT IS AN OBSOLETE  
PARAMETER**

The specified keyword has been eliminated from JES2. See *z/OS JES2 Commands* or *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Reference* to find the replacement for this keyword.

**45 IGNORED, VALUES ON HOT START ARE  
RESTORED TO PRIOR VALUES**

A request was made to alter a field that is maintained in CSA. The request is ignored and the field is restored on hot start to the CSA version.

**46 IGNORED, AS SPECIFIED BY LOCAL  
INSTALLATION \$SCAN TABLES**

The installation-defined WARNING operand on the \$SCANTAB macro matched the value specified on the \$SCAN WARNMSK operand.

**47 MODULE IS NOT REENTRANT**

Because the module is not reentrant, JES2 could not load the module into CSA. See message \$HASP875, RC=03 for more information.

**48 NEW CSA/LPA LOADMODS INVALID ON  
HOT START**

Because the common storage module was not loaded during a prior initialization of JES2, JES2 denies its load on a hot start. See message \$HASP875, RC=04 for more information.

**49 INSUFFICIENT STORAGE TO LOAD  
MODULE**

The amount of storage needed to load the module could not be allocated. See message \$HASP875, RC=05 for more information.

**51 MODULE NOT FOUND – MODULE CANNOT  
BE VERIFIED**

The \$MODCHK macro made no verification checks on the module because the address operand was not coded on the \$MODCHK macro and the entry point was not found in the load module table (\$LMT). See message \$HASP875, RC=12 for more information.

**52 NO SELECTABLE ENTRIES FOUND  
MATCHING SPECIFICATION**

Either a keyword request was made to \$SCAN but no entries matched the input, or JES2 determined that a requested operation is not required or cannot be fulfilled. This error typically occurs when a numeric or symbolic subscript is used and no entries matching the subscript are currently defined. For example, this message is issued if a display request for NODE(POK\*) was made and no control blocks that define nodes contained POK as the first three characters in the name.

Either JES2 could not find a device or the device it found was not in the range, didn't match the filter, or is in a state that could not be operated on.

**54 INVALID NODE NAME SPECIFIED**

A character name representing a node is expected, but the name is not valid. If this message appears for a NODE(nnnn) statement, then the following applies.

- The node name can only be an explicit destination value (that is, a numerical value) if both of the following are true:

- The value is not the same as another node number.
- The value is not the same as the DEST= value on the DESTID statement unless the DEST= value is also the number of this node (Nnnnn).

If you ignore this error message and proceed with initialization, JES2 will initialize but is unable to communicate with the duplicated node as specified by *trace-of-keywords*.

**55 REQUEST INVALID DUE TO ACTIVE STATUS**

The request to change or display characteristics is not permitted at this time because JES2 determined using the ACTFLAG, ACTSET, and ACTDISP operands on the \$SCANTAB macro for the keyword, that the object is active.

**56 EXISTING ENTRIES FOUND MATCHING SPECIFICATION**

The request to create a new control block (for example, \$ADD) is ignored because a matching control block already exists.

**57 DISPLAY TERMINATED DUE TO EXCESSIVE OUTPUT (AS DEFINED BY CONDEF DISPMAX)**

The number of lines of output that \$SCAN was to display exceeded either the maximum number of lines permitted by the DISPMAX= parameter on the CONDEF initialization statement or 9999999. \$SCAN processing truncates the display to that limit.

If you want \$SCAN to display the entire number of output lines, and the optional text "AS DEFINED BY CONDEF DISPMAX" to be displayed, you can use one of the following two ways:

1. Increase the DISPMAX= value and reissue the request.
2. For operator commands, reissue the request with the L= parameter to send the response to an out-of-line area.

**Note:** If the request was to change parameter values, by display, you can make the changes even though the display was truncated.

**58 SELECTION OF GENERIC/MULTIPLE ENTRIES FOR ALTERATION IS INVALID**

The keyword cannot be altered on a request that specified a generic or generic range subscript (for example DESTID(JES\*))

DEST=N3). This restriction is defined by the GENSET operand on the \$SCANTAB macro for the keyword.

**59 REQUEST INVALID DUE TO INACTIVE STATUS**

The request to change or display characteristics is not permitted at this time because JES2 determined using the ACTFLAG, ACTSET, and ACTDISP operands on the \$SCANTAB macro for the keyword, that the object is inactive.

**60 MODULE USER VERSION IS INVALID, EXPECTED-uver\_exp ACTUAL-uver\_act**

The module version in the module's module information table (MIT) does not match that in \$HCT. See message \$HASP875, RC=15 for more information.

**61 MODULE IBM USER VERSION IS INVALID**

The module version in the module's module information table (MIT) contains an unexpected value. See message \$HASP875, RC=16 for more information.

**62 CONSOLE LOCATION INVALID OR UNAVAILABLE**

The console identified on a \$T or \$ADD REDIRECT command is either unavailable or the identification is incorrect.

**63 NOT VALID FOR PATH MANAGER DEFINED CONNECTIONS**

A \$T CONNECT or \$DEL CONNECT command was entered for a connection that is not defined as a static connection. Either a CONNECT initialization statement does not exist for the specified connection or a \$ADD CONNECT command was not entered for the specified connection. Enter a \$ADD CONNECT command to override the non-static connection with a static one before reentering the original command.

**64 REJECTED – NETWORK PATH MANAGER NOT AVAILABLE**

A command was entered that requires the path manager services after JES2 suspended network path manager functions. See message \$HASP502.

**65 UNSUPPORTED LOCAL DEVICE TYPE**

The device specified by the UNIT keyword exists but JES2 does not support this as a local device. Use the MVS D U command to display which devices are defined.

**66 UNIT SPECIFIED DOES NOT EXIST**

The device specified by the UNIT keyword does not exist. Use the MVS D U command to display which units are defined.

**67 FSS SPECIFIED IS NOT DEFINED**

The FSS named in the FSS keyword of a \$ADD PRT(n) command does not exist. Use the \$D FSS command to display which FSSes are defined.

**68 VALUE MAY NOT BE SPECIFIED AT THIS TIME**

JES2 either processed an initialization statement or a \$T command, but could not set an attribute specified for a device.

*trace—of—keywords* in the message text indicates the attribute that could not be set. It may be possible to set the attribute later, but if you continue to receive this reason code with the same keyword you will not be able to set the attribute. For example, if you attempt to assign a compaction table with the COMPACT keyword on a device that does not support compaction (CMPCT=NO), you will always receive this reason code.

**69 CANNOT USE STRUCTURE *strname* WHILE RUNNING IN MODE=DUAL**

The current checkpoint mode is DUAL, but an attempt was made to assign a NEWCKPT*n* to a coupling facility structure by coding the STRNAME= keyword. Because the use of a coupling facility structure is only supported while running in DUPLEX mode, the request is denied. Issue the \$T CKPTDEF,MODE=DUPLEX command to change the checkpoint mode to DUAL and then retry the command assigning CKPTDEF to a coupling facility.

**70 ELEMENT VALUE MUST EXCEED PREVIOUS ELEMENT VALUE [BY AT LEAST *yyyy* ]**

A parameter range was specified which requires the second range element to be greater than the first range element by at least 1. The bracketed portion of the message appears only if the values must be different by more than 1.

**71 LINE/SHARABLE SPECIFICATIONS ARE NOT VALID**

A LINE= value on either the \$T RMT(nnnn) command or the \$ADD RMT(nnnn) command is **not**:

- Defined on a LINE(nnnn) initialization statement.
- Available for RJE (remote job entry) because it is dedicated to NJE (network job entry) use.

- Accessible because it is dedicated to another remote that has specified SHARABLE=NO on the RMT(nnnn) definition.
- Accessible because it is being used by another remote as a nondedicated line.

**72 CANNOT BE {MODIFIED | TERMINATED} BY ANOTHER RJE WORKSTATION**

A command (\$ADD RMT, \$T RMT, or \$P RMT) was issued from either another RJE workstation or from an JES2 NJE system that does not have proper authorization to issue the command. The command fails.

**73 ALL MEMBERS ARE NOT AT THE REQUIRED PRODUCT/SERVICE LEVEL**

All active JES2 MAS members are not at the correct service/product level to support the command. Active implies defined members that are not drained and not initializing.

- If you applied a new product level:  
See *z/OS Migration* for your new product level to determine actions that are required for the command to function.
- If you applied a new service level:  
See the documentation supplied with the maintenance you just applied to determine actions that are required for the command to function.

The command fails, notify the system programmer.

**74 CURRENT CHECKPOINT DATA SETS ARE TOO SMALL**

A command was issued which required an increase in the amount of space needed for the checkpoint data set(s). The current checkpoint is too small. Either there are not enough tracks in the data set or the size of an individual track is too small. This message is accompanied by either \$HASP295 (TRACK SIZE INSUFFICIENT) or \$HASP296 (*dsname* SPACE INSUFFICIENT). If the \$HASP296 message was issued, then issue a \$D CKPTSPACE command to determine the current set utilization. Then use the reconfiguration dialog to increase the size of and begin using the larger data set. If the \$HASP295 message was issued, then either use the reconfiguration dialog to move the data set to a volume that has a larger track size or decrease a CKPT size related parameter. See the \$HASP295 message for more information. In either case, the command fails.

**75 MEMBER *mmmm* NOT ALLOCATED TO BOTH CKPT DATA SETS (MODE=DUPLEX, DUPLEX=OFF)**

- A \$T command was issued which requires adjusting the size of the checkpoint, and the current member is not allocated to both checkpoint data sets. The command fails because of lack of checkpoint data set access.
- mmmm* is the member that currently has DUPLEX=OFF set.
- Note:** There may be more than one member that has DUPLEX=OFF. This is just the first member that was detected.
- 76 FILTER KEYWORD NOT ALLOWED AFTER SET KEYWORD**
- Before you specify any related set keyword(s), you must first specify the filter keyword(s).  
Example: Non-valid: \$t jobq,class=a,/class=b  
Valid: \$t jobq,/class=a,class=b
- 77 AT LEAST ONE FILTER MUST BE SPECIFIED**
- The command requires at least one filter.  
Example: Non-valid: \$pojQ Valid: \$pojQ,jm=alice\*
- 78 MULTIPLE JOBS FOUND**
- There is more than one job by the name specified in the system. Specify the job by number (jobid) if you want to affect all jobs with a name. Specify the name within parenthesis rather than quotes.
- 79 INCORRECT RETURN CODE FROM PRESCAN OR POSTSCAN ROUTINE**
- Pre-scan or post-scan routine returned a return code other than those allowed. Determine if it's either an installation exit or an IBM \$SCANTAB error. If an internal JES2 error, contact the IBM support center.
- 80 MISSING PRESCAN OR POSTSCAN ROUTINE**
- A pre-scan or post-scan routine specified on SCANTAB or an exit routine could not be found. Determine if it's either an installation exit or an IBM \$SCANTAB error. If an internal JES2 error, contact the IBM support center.
- 81 SOURCE OF COMMAND HAS IMPROPER AUTHORITY**
- The issuer of the command requires a higher level of authority. Example: Command required system authority and console specified from has job authority.
- 82 INVALID FILTER KEYWORD**
- The keyword entered is not a valid filter.
- 83 INVALID DELIMITER**
- A filter was entered with an invalid delimiter. For example, > (greater than) or < (less than) were entered when only <> (not equal to) or = (equal to) are valid delimiters. See *z/OS JES2 Commands* .
- 84 JOB IS BUSY, TRY LATER**
- Job is busy on a device and cannot be modified at this time.
- 85 JOB CANNOT BE CANCELLED; SPECIFY 'PROTECTED'**
- The operator entered one of the following against a protected job:
- A \$C command with the PURGE or ALL parameters
  - A \$O CANCEL command
  - A \$P command
- JES2 purges any output for the specified job(s) that is not protected. If the output for the specified job(s) is protected, JES2 ignores the command and continues processing. Specify the PROTECTED parameter on the command if you must cancel the job or output.
- 86 SPOOL VOLUME CANNOT BE STARTED – NO TRACK GROUPS AVAILABLE. CHECK MAX TGSPACE ON SPOOLDEF.**
- There are no more track groups available to start the spool volume. Increase TGSPACE to specify the number of track groups required.
- 87 JQ - ROUTECDE - INCORRECT COMBINATION OF FILTERS SPECIFIED. MUST SPECIFY BOTH '>' AND '<' FILTERS, OR NEITHER.**
- An attempt was made to filter on ROUTECDE= or DEST= using a > or < filter, but either:
- A > filter was specified without a < filter, or a < filter was specified without a > filter.
- The route code comparisons therefore result in an open-ended range, which is not allowed. To avoid this message, an additional route code filter must be provided on the command.
- 88 INCORRECT RANGE OF ROUTE CODES SPECIFIED**
- The command entered attempted to filter on a range of route codes using > and < filters, but the resulting range was inconsistent because:
- The high and low bounds of the range specified different node names, and the nodal route codes were not both specified as 'node.\*', or



- The low bound of the range specified a special local route code (Unnnn or equivalent) and the high bound of the range did not, or
  - The low bound of the range specified a userid route code, and the high bound specified a remote route code (Rnnnn or equivalent).
  
- 89 JOB CANNOT BE CANCELLED**

The operator has attempted to cancel a job which is not cancelable. The most common reasons are the job is marked non-cancelable by MVS or you tried to cancel an executing STC (you must use the MVS CANCEL command to cancel a started task in execution). The message is issued and no MVS CANCEL is issued for that job.
  
- 90 NOT DEFINED TO WLM**

The operator has attempted to modify the default SCHENV for a jobclass or has attempted to modify the SCHENV for a job and the SCHENV name is not defined to WLM.
  
- 91 nnnnnn FAILURE**

The MVS service listed was called and returned an error. Details of the error are in previous messages.
  
- 92 NOT VALID FOR DEMAND SELECT JOBS**

The command was issued against a started task or time sharing user which is not allowed.
  
- 93 NOT EXECUTING**

Command could not complete because job is not actively executing.
  
- 94 JOB/OUTPUT QUEUE ERROR DETECTED, RC=rc**

*rc* identified the type of queue error detected. Reason codes from X'01' X'7F' are errors encountered in the job queue. Reason codes X'80' to X'FF' are errors encountered in the output queue.
  
- 95 INSUFFICIENT BERTS**

Operator command failed because of a BERT shortage.
  
- 96 NOT SPINNABLE**

\$T J/S/T,SPIN valid only if JESLOG=SPIN or JESLOG=(SPIN,xxxx)
  
- 97 LOGICAL PARMLIB {MEMBER NOT FOUND | ALLOCATION FAILED}**

An error was returned from the MVS IEFPRMLB service while trying to access the default PARMLIB concatenation.
  
- 98 PROCESSING INCLUDE keyword error**

An error was encountered processing the keyword in the message.

In the message text *keyword error* is one of the following:

  - MEMBER - NO BASE DATA SET
  - MEMBER - BASE DATA SET IS NOT PDS
  - DSN - MEMBER NOT SPECIFIED FOR PDS
  
- 99 REJECTED - JOB IS POST EXECUTION**

The operator issued a command against a job that has completed execution. The command contained an operand only valid for jobs that have not yet executed.
  
- 100 REJECTED - AT LEAST ONE DATA SET IS REQUIRED IN PROCLIB(xxxxxxxx) CONCATENATION**

The operator issued a \$T command to delete a data set from the PROCLIB concatenation. However, this was the only data set within the PROCLIB(xxxxxxxx) concatenation, where xxxxxxxx is the PROCLIB name for which the message is issued. Because JES2 requires there be at least one data set in the concatenation it does not delete the data set and rejects the command.
  
- 101 SUBSYSTEM INTERFACE NOT DORMANT, COLD START NOT ALLOWED**

A start parameter of COLD or FORMAT was specified, but there is an active subsystem interface (SSI).
  
- 102 CONFLICTING FILTERS SPECIFIED**

Mutually exclusive filters were specified.
  
- 103 INTERNAL ERROR – R11 = HCT NOT ALLOWED IN NON-JES2 ADDRESS SPACE**

A \$SCANTAB specified a prescan, postscan, or cleanup routine that requires the HCT (JES2 or SUBTASK) environment, but the invoking table was requested outside the JES2 address space.
  
- 104 SOCKET MUST SPECIFY LOCAL NODE**

A NETSRV points to a SOCKET whose NODE= value does not specify the local node.
  
- 105 DEVICE TYPE UNSUPPORTED BY ASSOCIATED REMOTE**

The remote device points to a line that is not of the correct type (for example, a SNA remote points to a TCP/IP line) .
  
- 106 CANNOT SET DYNAMIC IF NOT ACTIVE ON ALL MEMBERS**

The QAFF for the service class is not set to 'ANY'.

**107 SERVICE CLASS NOT DEFINED OR WLM ERROR**

The service class name given in a \$\$/\$P/\$T SRVCLASS(serviceclass) is not defined.

**108 OUTPUT QUEUE IS FULL**

An additional Job Output Element (JOE) was necessary to complete the command, but none were available. You can issue a \$T OUTDEF,JOENUM= command to increase the number of output elements.

**System action:** The system does the following:

- If JES2 encounters an incorrect initialization statement, JES2 ignores all parameters on that statement. If the initialization statement is defining a device, JES2 will create that device using all device default settings.
- If JES2 encounters an incorrect initialization statement, parameter processing requests input from the operator console instead of from the normal PARMLIB input, thus allowing the operator to correct the error, if necessary.
- If a JES2 command was entered in error, processing continues. The command does not take effect.
- If the error was encountered while JES2 was trying to issue a message, see the documentation of that message for the system action.

**Operator response:** Do one of the following:

- If an operator command was entered in error, correct the problem and reenter the command.
- If the error occurred while JES2 was trying to issue message **HASPnnn**, see the documentation of that message and respond accordingly.

**System programmer response:** See *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Reference* or *z/OS JES2 Installation Exits* for information about correcting the initialization statement errors.

**Detecting Module:** HASPCOMM, HASPNUC, HASCSCAN, HASPSERV, HASPSXIT, HASPSXDV, HASPSXNJ, HASPSXOT

**Routing Code:** 1,2,10

**Descriptor Code:** 2,7

**Note:** If **ERROR BUILDING MESSAGE HASPnnn** is displayed, this message (\$HASP003) also has the routing and descriptor codes of message **\$HASPnnn**.

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**\$HASP004**

**Explanation:**

►►—COMMAND PREFIX INVALID:—*text*—RC=—*rsnc*—►►

The command prefix specified by the CONCHAR parameter of the CONDEF statement either at initialization or through a \$T command is not valid. In the message text:

**rsnc** The reason code.

**text** The explanatory text accompanying the reason code.

*rsnc text*

**01 PREFIX ALREADY DEFINED**

The prefix specified already exists in the sysplex, if the scope is SYSPLEX, or on this system, if the scope is SYSTEM.

**02 PREFIX IS A SUBSET OF ANOTHER**

**System action:** If JES2 detects the error during initialization, JES2 issues message \$HASP428 and then ends. If JES2 detects the error while processing a \$T command, the command fails and JES2 continues to use the previously defined prefix.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer.

**System programmer response:** For JES2 initialization, choose a different command prefix. For a \$T command, either choose a new prefix or JES2 continues to use the prefix already in use.

**Descriptor Code:** 4

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**\$HASP005**

**Explanation:**

**System action:** JES2 initialization processing ends.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer.

JES2 has a shortage of the resource type identified in the message text. The threshold percentage of

A resource shortage is defined as one of the following:

- The demand for the resource exceeded 100% within the last 32 seconds. The message includes optional text indicating that JES2 was unable to fulfill some request for the resource. **nnn** The current utilization percentage of the resource.

**aaaaa** The total number of resource *resource-type* that is currently defined.

**yyyyy** The number of resource *resource-type* for which JES2 processors are currently waiting, because their requests could not be satisfied. If this value is non-zero, the utilization percentage (*nnn*) might be less than the threshold percentage.

**yyy** The amount of the resource being waited for, expressed as a percentage of the currently defined total.

**zzz** The number of processors that attempted to obtain resource *resource-type*, but had their requests denied because of a shortage, and did not wait for the resource. If this value is non-zero, the utilization percentage (*nnn*) might be less than the threshold percentage.



- bbbb** The size of the largest unfulfilled request for *resource-type*.

- Entering the \$OQ command to release held output.
- Purging unneeded output.
- Making unprocessed output eligible for selection by changing printer characteristics.

**System programmer response:** If this message appears frequently (or continues to be issued):

- Increase the percent utilization value with an operator command.
- Take steps to lower the usage of the resource.
- If the extended form of the message appears, increase the number of the resource to at least *cccc*, if possible.

**rname** The name (minor name) of the resource that is the target of ENQ. The major name is SYSZJES2.

**System action:** The ENQ being requested is not obtained and error processing begins. If the resource represents the JES2 checkpoint data set, a reconfiguration dialog will appear.

**Operator response:** Respond as directed by subsequent messages to recover the resource that is the target of the ENQ.

**System programmer response:** See the explanation of the return and reason codes for the ISGENQ macro to determine the appropriate action.

An input/output error has occurred on the indicated JES2 device.

In the message text:

**device** The VOLSER associated with the device.

**unit** Specifies a 4-digit hexadecimal device number.

**cc1** EXCP compatibility completion code associated with the error.

**cc2** IOS completion code from the IOBE control block (if available).

**41** Permanent I/O error.

**42** Extent error (DASD only). Either IOBSEEK lies outside the extents described by the DEB or the channel program attempted execution outside the current extent.

**43** Duplexed I/O request was not started because of the UCB level or a not ready device.

**44** An error occurred after the previous I/O request to the device was posted complete. The appendages and (if allowed to execute) the ERP have determined that it is a permanent error. The I/O request is terminated with the permanent error. The CSW contents and sense data in the IOB do not apply to the attempted operation. 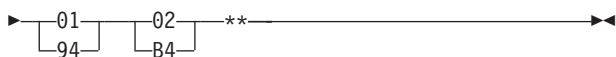

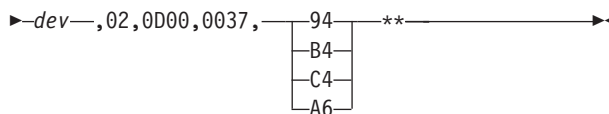

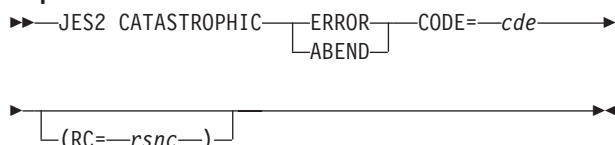

An error has caused the JES2 main task to enter the main task ESTAE routine because of an ABEND or ERROR.

If the message displays ABEND, an MVS system service (GETMAIN processing, for example) detected an error or abnormally ended.

If the message displays ERROR, JES2 processing detected the error.

In the message text:

**cde** One of the error codes (if a CATASTROPHIC ERROR) in the following list or one of the system completion codes (if a CATASTROPHIC ABEND) documented in *z/OS MVS System Codes*.

**rsnc** The reason code associated with the cause of this occurrence.

The *cde* field contains one of the following codes; if there is an associated reason code, this is displayed also.

**Error cde**

**Explanation**

- \$A01** JES2 detected more channel end indications for a device than expected. Only one channel end indication should be received from IOS for each input/output operation that JES2 has initiated.
- \$AR1** JES2 detected an internal error while processing a request from the automatic restart manager.
- \$AR2** JES2 could not process a request from the automatic restart manager because the job was active when it shouldn't have been.
- \$B01** Either an attempt has been made to return a JES2 buffer that contains an error to the buffer pool, or the free buffer chain has been destroyed.
- \$B02** Although the available buffer count for a buffer pool is non-zero, no buffer is indicated as available.
- \$B03** A JES2 processor attempted, in a single request, to obtain more buffers from a buffer pool than the maximum possible size that pool would allow.
- \$BR1 ERROR PROCESSING BERT MAPS**  
JES2 initialization processing encountered an error examining the BERT maps.
- \$BR2 LOGIC ERROR DETECTED BY \$DOGBERT SERVICE**  
A logic error has been detected in the calling sequence to the \$DOGBERT service routine.
- \$BR3 DATA ERROR DETECTED BY xxxxxxx SERVICE**  
A service routine has detected a data error in the BERT CTENT. This code will only occur when DEBUG BERT=YES has also been specified.
- \$BR4 PCE \$WAITED WITH A SPECIAL=YES BERT CB**  
SPECIAL=YES has been coded on a prior \$DOGBERT or \$DOGJQE call, but a \$WAIT occurred between the ACTION=FETCH and the ACTION=RETURN.
- \$BR5 NO BERTS TO LOCK SPECIAL=YES CB**  
The \$DOGBERT call fetches data from BERTs with SPECIAL=NO. A subsequent call was made to update the BERTs. More BERTs were needed for that update and there are no BERTs available on the system.
- \$BR6 OVERLAPPING \$BERTTAB ENTRIES**

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JES2 has detected that \$BERTTAB entries have been coded which unexpectedly used overlapping offsets. The \$HASP474 message issued in conjunction with this error indicates the tables that were in error.

### \$CF1 COUPLING FACILITY FAILURE

JES2 initialization processing has encountered an unexpected error processing data on a coupling facility. This can be caused by starting JES2 pointing to a coupling facility structure that is not compatible with the version of JES2 being started.

JES2 has detected an incorrect list element control value associated with an element in a JES2 checkpoint structure.

It is possible that you are attempting to start a JES2 member with initialization parameters that are incompatible with the initialization parameters that are either:

- a. Currently in effect in the MAS  
or
- b. Different from those specified at cold-start time

Under these circumstances, the format of the checkpoint data set already in effect can be very different from the one expected on the member you are attempting to start. This discrepancy can cause various errors to occur, including the display of this message.

This is an example of conditions that can cause these errors to occur:

You have attempted to change a cold start initialization parameter during a warm start (for example, JOBNUM= on the JOBDEF initialization statement). See the *z/OS JES2 Initialization and Tuning Reference* for a description of initialization parameters that require a cold start.

System Programmer Response: Correct the initialization parameters so that they are compatible with the with the cold start initialization parameters currently in effect.

See the JES2 Migration Notebook applicable for the highest JES2 release running in the MAS for more details on checkpoint compatibility.

### \$CF1 JES2 ERROR DURING COUPLING FACILITY ACCESS

During normal checkpoint processing, JES2 encountered an unexpected return code from an IXLLIST request.

**\$CF2** An I/O error occurred on a checkpoint data set that resides on a coupling facility structure and 'TERM' was specified in a checkpoint reconfiguration.

**\$D01** The \$GETABLE service routine was unable to locate the DTE table for the subtask identifier specified in the \$DTEDYN ATTACH macro call.

**\$D02** The DTE table for the specified subtask identifier requests information from the user control table (UCT), however no UCT address was found in the HCT pointer field \$UCT.

**\$D03** RC=(MVS IDENTIFY return code). The MVS IDENTIFY for the subtask requested on this \$DTEDYN ATTACH macro failed.

**\$D04** The \$GETABLE service routine was unable to locate the DTE table for the subtask identifier specified in the \$DTEDYN DETACH macro call.

**\$D05** The DTE passed by the caller of \$DTEDYN DETACH failed validity checking. Either the EBCDIC eye catcher was not 'DTE' or the subtask name in the DTE did not match the name in the DTE table.

**\$D06** The event control block (ECB) that ends the subtask was not posted before a \$DTEDYND macro was issued to detach the subtask. All subtasks must return to MVS before \$DTEDYND issues the MVS DETACH macro for that subtask.

**\$D07** The DTE table for the specified subtask identifier requested information from the user control table (UCT), however no UCT address was found in the HCT pointer field \$UCT.

**\$D08** The \$DTEDYN ATTACH service has found an entry point address to be zero.

**\$D09** The \$DTEDYN ATTACH service has found a HEAD=field address that is not valid.

**\$D10** The \$DTEDYN service cannot find a required name/token pair.

**\$D11** The \$DTEDYN DETACH service has found a HEAD=field address that is not valid.

**\$D12** The \$DTEDYN DETACH service cannot find a required name/token pair.

### **\$DB1 INCORRECT TYPE PASSED TO \$DILBERT**

Call to \$DILBERT services was made which passed an invalid TYPE=parameter.

### **\$DB2 INCORRECT TYPE PASSED TO \$DILBERT**

The processing routine specified on the \$DILBERT Macro returned a return code that is not supported. The reason code associated with \$DB2 is the bad return code.

### **\$DB3 \$DILBERT INLINE PARMLIST MISMATCH**

- The in-line parameter list passed to the \$DILBERT service is incompatible with the routine. The most likely cause is a failure to reassemble a module containing a \$DILBERT macro call.
- \$DD1** The \$GETABLE service routine was unable to locate a DCT table related to the DCT name specified in the \$DCTDYN macro call.
- \$DD2** Indicates that a WSTAB address was found on a \$DCTTAB that was not eligible for job or SYSOUT selection.
- \$DD3** A required name/token pair could not be located by the \$DCTDYN service.
- \$DD4** \$DCTDYN was unable to build device name.
- \$DJ1** **EXIT CODE RETURNING NON-EXIT MODE JQA**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called by a JES2 exit to perform a \$DOGJQE ACTION=RETURN. The JQA being returned was obtained by IBM code, not by exit code.
- \$DJ2** **EXIT CODE DID NOT RETURN EXIT MODE JQA**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called by a JES2 exit to perform a \$DOGJQE ACTION=RETURN. The JQA being returned was obtained by exit code and not subsequently freed before returning to JES2.
- \$DP1** \$XECB is not valid or is being \$WAITed on by two PCEs.
- \$DP2** Data was on a linkage stack when a \$WAIT macro was issued.
- \$DP3** **\$WAIT WAS ISSUED FROM INITIALIZATION PCE**
- A \$WAIT has been issued during JES2 initialization, before the initialization of the JES2 PCE dispatcher.
- \$DP4** **\$WAIT WAS ISSUED FROM JES2 SUBTASK**
- A \$WAIT has been issued from a JES2 subtask.
- \$DP5** The JES2 dispatcher has found a PCE eyecatcher that is not valid.
- \$E01** The total number of channel end indications from IOS has exceeded the total number of input/output operations initiated by JES2. For example, the total number of outstanding input/output operations became negative.
- \$EP1** The routine specified on a \$PCTAB resolved to an address of zero.
- \$EP2** The routine specified on a \$PCTAB for a common PC cannot be found in the common storage.
- \$EN1** JES2 or an installation exit routine either called a JES2 service routine or used a macro that called a service routine that issued the \$EN1 error code. This error code indicates that the service does not support running under the processor type (PCEID) of the caller.
- \$ER1** A JES2 processor is attempting to cancel or replace its current JES2 recovery environment, but there is no recovery environment associated with the current save area level. That is, the processor has not established a recovery environment since it obtained control, and therefore cannot cancel one.
- \$ER2** JES2 detected a non-valid track address in module HASPRAS during an I/O operation.
- \$ER5** When a JES2 processor recovery routine returned control, critical register contents or control block contents (or both) had been destroyed.
- \$ER9** There is a logic error in the JES2 processing associated with (but not included in) a JES2 processor recovery routine.
- \$G01** JES2 issued the GETMAIN macro instruction for storage for a TGB (track group buffer), but the required storage is not available in subpool 0.
- \$GF1** **ATTEMPT TO FREE SUBPOOL 0**
- An attempt was made to \$FREMAIN subpool 0. This is not allowed in the JES2 main task. This is probably an incorrect call to the \$FREMAIN service.
- \$GF2** **UNEXPECTED LENGTH OF 0**
- A \$FREMAIN request was issued with a length value passed as zero. If allowed to continue, this would result in a subpool FREEMAIN. If a subpool FREEMAIN is required, then do not code LV= on the \$FREMAIN call. Otherwise, correct the length specification for the \$FREMAIN call.
- \$GS1** A subtask work queue error was detected.
- \$GT1** **\$GETABLE - INVALID TABLE ENTRY**
- The \$GETABLE service has located a table pair in which the JES2 table pointer points to a USER table, or the USER table pointer points to a HASP table, or a dynamic table pointer does not point to a dynamic table. The probable cause is either a mismatch of levels of the \$MCT macro, or a failure to use the \$PAIR macro to define a table pair.
- \$GW1** Either a JES2 processor requested a work area larger than the maximum size allowed, or a processor's total work area requests are larger than the total allowed.



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- \$GW2** One of the following occurred:
- RC=04** A JES2 processor has attempted to return a work area with an incorrect pool identifier.
  - RC=08** A JES2 processor has attempted to return a larger work area than it acquired.
  - RC=12** A JES2 processor has attempted to return a work area which has already been marked as free.
  - RC=16** \$RETNWORK has discovered that the cell control prefix for the cell being returned has been overlaid.
- \$GW3** A JES2 processor used part of a work area that it did not own. (For \$DEBUG=YES only.)
- \$GW4** A \$GETWORK request was issued unconditionally (without ERRET= on the macro), and the GETMAIN, required to satisfy the request, failed.
- \$I04** The \$GETABLE service routine was unable to locate a DCT table related to the DCT type specified in the INITRTE subroutine in HASPIRMA.
- \$I05** An internal logic error has occurred in one of the HASPIRDA routines. The reason code indicates the routine and type of error.
- RC=04** The main routine, IRDA, received a return code from KTRK1IO indicating IRDA passed bad parameters to KTRK1IO. This occurred while attempting to lock the checkpoint data set.
  - RC=08** The main routine, IRDA, received a return code from KTRK1IO indicating IRDA passed incorrect parameters to KTRK1IO. This occurred while attempting to read the master record from the checkpoint data set.
  - RC=12** The main routine, IRDA, received a return code from TRK1IO indicating IRDA passed incorrect parameters to KTRK1IO. This occurred while attempting to read the entire first track from the checkpoint data set.
  - RC=16** The main routine, IRDA, received a return code from TRK1IO indicating IRDA passed incorrect parameters to KTRK1IO. This occurred while attempting to write the lock at the end of IRDA processing.
  - RC=20** IRDA processing had a failure in PARM=UNACTIVATE processing. Unexpected return code from CKPTVSIZ.
- RC=24** IRDA processing cannot find the local KITs for either the NITC or RECY CTENTS.
- \$I06** **ENF TYPE 40 SIGNAL ERROR**  
**REASON=(return code from the ENFREQ macro)**
- The ENF 40 signal was not issued during JES2 initialization. Recover from this abend and allow JES2 to complete initialization.
- Operator Action:** Hot start JES2 if OMVS is needed.
- \$IP1** Input services incurred a GETMAIN failure.
- \$IP2** JES2 detected an error in the parameter list passed to the Security Authorization Facility to validate the job.
- \$IP3** JES2 read a job card from an input device. JES2 passed control to installation exit 2. After exit 2 returned, JES2 detected that the card was changed. JES2 scanned the card and could not recognize it as a job card. Exit 2 has probably overlaid the card.
- \$IR1** JES2 detected an error in the internal reader protected buffer. The pointer to the current job within the buffer does not point to a valid location. JES2 deletes the current job on the internal reader.
- \$IR2** JES2 detected a serialization error for an internal reader. JES2 deletes the current job on the internal reader.
- \$IV8** **QUEUE VERIFY ERROR FOLLOWING \$IVATE**
- Reverification of job queue after \$ACTIVATE failed.
- \$IV82** **JQT KIT NOT FOUND FOLLOWING \$IVATE**
- \$ACTIVATE LEVEL=R4 processing failed to find the JQT CTENT.
- \$J05** JES2 detected an error with either the chaining or the type of JQE or JOE by one of the job output service routines:
- RC=04** The work JOE does not point to a characteristics JOE.
  - RC=08** JES2 cannot find the work JOE that was requested to be removed from a characteristics JOE chain (JOECHAINXT).
  - RC=12** Either the subject JQE has no work JOEs or JES2 cannot find the work JOE requested to be removed from a JQE.
  - RC=16** The use count of the characteristics JOE is zero, but it still points to a work JOE.

- RC=20** The work JOE points to an alleged characteristics JOE that is not a characteristics JOE.
- RC=24** The JQE pointed to by the JOE is a free JQE.
- \$J06** \$#POST was entered when not under control of \$QSUSE macro.
- \$J07** The \$#ADD routine detected that a \$JOE that was to be added to a \$JOT had an erroneous SYSOUT class. Valid SYSOUT classes are (A-Z, 0-9).
- \$J08** JES2 detected an error in the output queues and the detecting routine was not able to correct the error.
- RC=04** The verification/correction routine(s) detected an error. JES2 issues the \$HASP498 message, which asks the operator if the JOT queues should be totally rebuilt.
- RC=08** The rebuild routine detected an error. JES2 issues the \$HASP499 message, indicating both the correction and rebuild routines have failed.
- \$J09** **JOE ON INCORRECT QUEUE**  
A JOE does not have the correct JOETYPE. Possible causes are:
- Something other than a work JOE is passed to one of the job output service routines.
  - A free JOE queue points to a JOE that isn't marked 'free'.
- RC=0** A work JOE is expected and the JOE is not a work JOE
- RC=4** JES2 just removed a JOE that is not a free JOE from the free JOE chain.
- \$J10** **INCORRECT JOE ADDRESS**  
The JOE address passed to one of the job output service routines was not a valid JOE address.
- RC=04** The JOE address is not within the valid range of JOE addresses.
- RC=08** The JOE address is not on a control block boundary.
- \$J11** **ATTEMPT TO BUSY A JOE DURING WARM START**  
During warm-start processing, JES2 attempted to set on the busy system indicator for a JOE. Changing the system busy indicator for a JOE cannot occur during a warm-start because it would conflict with the recovery processing of busy JOEs.
- \$J12** **QUEUES NOT OWNED ENTERING \$#JWEL**  
The caller of \$#JWEL failed to ensure the checkpoint queues were owned, that is, it failed to do a \$QSUSE) prior invoking the \$#JWEL macro.
- \$K01** Alteration of checkpoint record contents when not under control of \$QSUSE macro. (For DEBUG=YES only.)
- \$K02** The coupling facility lock was stolen unexpectedly by another member of the MAS.
- \$K03** One of the following is true:
1. Two members are using the same member name.
  2. There is a time stamp synchronization problem in a multi-access spool configuration. This is typically caused by an incorrect operator reply to message \$HASP420 or some other operator error.
- This error (\$K03) requires that you re-IPL the system.
- \$K04** An attempt was made to recover from a permanent I/O error on a checkpoint data set. Although the recovery was successful, an error occurred on the "companion" checkpoint data set during a checkpoint reconfiguration. (CKPT2 is the companion for CKPT1 and vice versa.) In an attempt to recover from the I/O error on the companion data set, JES2 initiated a subsequent checkpoint reconfiguration, and the operator replied TERM to \$HASP272.
- \$K05** A checkpoint record has been changed, but not flagged for checkpoint. (For DEBUG=YES only.)
- \$K06** The operator issued the \$T CKPTDEF,RECONFIG=Yes command (the blank between \$T and CKPTDEF is optional) to enter a checkpoint reconfiguration dialog with JES2. This dialog is not possible because there are no checkpoint data sets presently in use.
- \$K08** An abend has occurred during a checkpoint reconfiguration. This error requires that you re-IPL the system.
- \$K10** A permanent read error has occurred on a checkpoint data set. The reason code (RC=) indicates the reason for the error.
- RC=04** An I/O error occurred while attempting to acquire a RESERVE (using the MVS RESERVE macro) for the checkpoint data set.
- RC=08** The check value in the HASP communications table (HCT) does not agree with the check value in the CHECK record.

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- RC=12** An I/O error occurred while reading the 4K pages of the checkpoint data set.
- RC=16** An I/O error occurred while reading the first track of the checkpoint data set.
- RC=20** An I/O error occurred while attempting to acquire the checkpoint lock.
- \$K13** The checkpoint lock, which has been read, contains erroneous information.
- \$K15** An attempt to format the checkpoint data set was unsuccessful. If this error occurs after initialization, you must re-IPL the system.
- \$K17** A checkpoint read channel program was interrupted. Retries were also interrupted.
- \$K18** A checkpoint write channel program was interrupted.
- This I/O error occurred on the only checkpoint data set allocated by this member. There will be a backup copy of the checkpoint data set only if one of the following is true:
- The JES2 configuration is running in DUPLEX mode and another member has specified DUPLEX=ON. The DUPLEX data set can then be used as the backup copy.
  - Before ABENDING, this member created an emergency backup copy of the checkpoint in the data set named SYS1.EMERGENCY.HASPCKPT.
- \$K19** The same error occurred as indicated by \$K18 except that both CKPTn data sets were allocated to this member during the error.
- Although the CKPTn data set without the error may contain a valid copy of the checkpoint, it is recommended that you restart JES2 with the SYS1.EMERGENCY.HASPCKPT data set, providing that it was previously specified (in response to a \$HASP279 message).
- \$K20** JES2 detected an incorrect change log address list entry while updating the checkpoint records from the change log.
- \$K21** JES2 detected an incorrect change log address list entry while building the change log.
- \$K22** An internal logic error has occurred in one of the checkpoint related routines. The reason code indicates the routine and type of error.
- RC=04** The routine CKPTALOC was unable to locate the UCB for a checkpoint data set even though an OBTAIN indicates the volume is mounted. Because a recovery routine exists for this error, recovery will be attempted.
- RC=08** The routine KTRK1IO detected that
- an incorrect parameter list was passed to it when called from KREAD1.
- RC=12** The routine KTRK1IO, called from KREAD1, detected that I/O was already active for a checkpoint data set before attempting a lock read operation.
- \$K23** JES2 detected that either one or both of the active checkpoint data sets being used by this member of the multi-access spool (MAS) configuration was forwarded (possibly because of error recovery on another member). Because this member detected the forwarded data set(s) during normal processing, it could not perform the necessary recovery action. When you restart JES2, initialization processing will detect a change in the checkpoint data set configuration.
- \$K24** Internal error: JES2 has detected that the checkpoint data set configuration has been altered by another member of the multi-access spool (MAS) configuration (possibly because of error recovery action on another member). Because this member detected the change during normal processing, it could not perform the necessary recovery action. When you restart JES2, initialization processing will detect a change in the checkpoint data set configuration.
- \$K25** **FCT REQUESTED ABEND BIT SET**
- Internal error: JES common coupling services installation exits IXZXIT01 or IXZXIT02 set the bit to request an abend during JESXCF inter-member communications. This bit is available for testing and diagnostic purposes.
- \$K26** **INCOMPATIBLE LEVELS OF CODE DETECTED**
- Internal error: a JES2 checkpoint reconfiguration was attempted between JES2 members at incompatible service levels for the \$CKX data area. Return codes are:
- | RC= | Meaning   |

- System Programmer's Response:** Ensure that every MAS member has a compatible \$CKX data area service level.



**\$K27 CKPT RECONFIGURATION ALREADY STARTED**

Internal error: a checkpoint reconfiguration is already started on another MAS member and has progressed too far for this member to participate. A reason code is set from the second byte of field PCEID in the \$PCE data area.

**\$K28 INTERNAL ERROR DETECTED BY HASPCKRR**

Internal error: either incorrect data was passed to the checkpoint reconfiguration routine or the inter-member communication routine was called out of sequence. Return codes are:

**RC= Meaning**

- 1** A \$CKM data area was not passed to the inter-member communication routine

Internal error: KDLRSERV routine returned with an unexpected return code.

### \$K34 UNEXPECTED RETURN CODE FROM JESXCF

Internal error: an interface error with JES common coupling services. An unexpected return code was returned from a IXZXIcc service. See the \$HASP088 message for the reason and return codes in R0 and R15, respectively, for call codes 01 through 07, and see message \$HASP777 for call code 08. (Call code 08 has a return code in R15 only.)

A print processor detected an incorrect PQE count.
- \$PP1** **PQE CHAINING ERROR**  
A print processor detected an incorrectly chained PQE. The reason code describes how the PQE is incorrectly chained:
- RC=04** The PQE address is the PQE header address.
- RC=08** The PQE is on the free queue.
- RC=12** The PQE forward pointer loops to the same PQE.
- RC=16** The PQE backward pointer loops to the same PQE.
- RC=20** The PQE backward pointer is incorrect.
- RC=24** The PQE forward pointer is incorrect.

**RC=28** The PQEJ forward pointer loops to the same PQE for a job start PQE (PQEJ).

- \$PP2** **PQE IS NOT ON THE FREE QUEUE**  
A print processor detected an active PQE on the PQE free queue.
- \$PP3** **PQE IS IN ERROR**  
A print processor detected an error with an active PQE. The problem is one of the following:
- The data set PQE is not a valid PQED
  - The job start PQE is not a valid PQEJ
  - The PQE is pointing to itself.
- \$PP4** **EXCP FOR IOB ALREADY IN PROGRESS**  
JES2 Print/Punch processing is about to initiate I/O to a printer/punch and has unexpectedly discovered that I/O is already in progress.
- PS0** **NO PCE FOR ACTIVE PSO**  
An active PSO was detected but a search of PSO PCEs found none processing the PSO.
- PS1** **JQELOCK not held at TREGROUP**  
TREGROUP service routine was called without holding job lock.
- PS2** **JQELOCK not held at PSOFRELK**  
PSOFRELK service routine was called without holding the job lock.
- \$PT1** **\$PUTABLE INVALID TABLE ENTRY**  
The \$PUTABLE service has located a table pair which a dynamic table pointer does not point to a dynamic table. The probable cause is either a mismatch of levels of the \$MCT macro, or a failure to use the \$PAIR macro to define a table pair.
- \$Q01** A JES2 processor requested a job queue service routine function with incorrect arguments or failed to ensure that the job queue checkpoint processor was not active for a \$QMOD service function.
- \$Q02** A JES2 processor requested a job queue service but failed to find the queue for the type specified in the job's JQE. To ensure a clean recovery, this error requires that you perform an all-member warm start of JES2.
- \$Q03** **REQUIRED \$QSUSE CONTROL NOT OBTAINED**  
A service was called that requires the caller to own the checkpoint queues, but the caller does not own them. The caller must issue a \$QSUSE macro to obtain ownership before

- calling the service, or before attempting to modify a checkpointed control block.
- \$Q04** JES2 has detected an incorrect checkpoint queue element address. The reason code indicates the exact error.
- RC=04** The element address passed to the \$CKPT service routine is lower than the valid range of addresses for the element type.
- RC=08** The element address passed to the \$CKPT service routine is higher than the valid range of addresses for the element type.
- RC=12** The element address passed to the \$CKPT service routine does not point to the start of the control block being \$CKPTed.
- \$Q05 INCORRECT JOB QUEUE CHANGE REQUEST**
- A JES2 processor requested a job queue service with the \$QMOD macro to change the processing phase of a job when the change was not allowed.
- \$Q06 JQE ON INCORRECT QUEUE**
- The JQE obtained from the free queue had a type indication other than free or while running a JQE queue, a JQE with an incorrect queue type was encountered. This is a JES2 internal logic error.
- \$Q07 INCORRECT JQE ADDRESS**
- The JQE address passed to one of the job service routines was not a valid JQE or JQA address.
- \$Q08 ATTEMPT TO QUEUE JOB TO NON-EXISTENT QUEUE**
- A \$QADD, \$QMOD, or \$QPUT service requested a job queue type that is not valid.
- \$Q09** The caller of the \$GETLOKW service did not establish access to the checkpoint queues using the \$QSUSE macro.
- \$Q10** The \$GETLOKW or \$FRELOKW service was called from an unexpected PCE.
- \$Q11 JQE/JIX MISMATCH**
- A job has a job number that the JIX indicates is either unassigned or assigned to another job.
- \$Q12 REQUEST TO MANIPULATE FREE JQE**
- The caller passed a 'free' JQE to a service routine.
- \$Q13 ATTEMPT TO BUSY A JQE DURING WARM START**
- During warm-start processing, JES2 attempted to set on the busy system indicator for a JQE. Changing the system busy indicator for a JQE cannot occur during a warm-start because it would conflict with the recovery processing of busy JQEs.
- \$Q14 JQE CHANGED WHILE JQA ACTIVE**
- JES2 detected an update to a real JQE while an artificial JQE was locked using \$DOGJQE. Updates to JQE without \$DOGJQE serialization is not allowed.
- \$Q15 JQE NOT ARTIFICIAL**
- A job was being added to a WLM service class queue, however, a real JQE was passed to the queue service but an artificial JQE was required.
- \$Q16 \$DOGJQE FETCH,UPDATE AND QUEUES NOT OWNED**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called to support ACTION=(FETCH,UPDATE) or ACTION=(FETCHNEXT,UPDATE), or ACTION=REFRESH and the JES2 queues are not owned.
- \$Q17 DJACCESS INCORRECT CALLING SEQUENCE**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called to support ACTION=FETCHNEXT, ACTION=REFRESH, ACTION=SETACCESS or ACTION=MANAGEACCESS. The caller has failed to provide a valid JQA address.
- \$Q18 INCORRECT ACTION AGAINST UNLOCKED JQA**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called to perform an action other than FREE or MANAGEACCESS,ACQUIRE for a JQA which previously had been set in a lock freed state by a MANAGEACCESS,RELEASE call.
- \$Q19 \$DOGJQE FETCHNEXT NOT VALID IF STACK**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called to perform a FETCHNEXT using a JQA as input which has a stack of users.
- \$Q20 \$DOGJQE IMPROPER JQA EMPTY STATUS**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called to support ACTION=FETCH and was given a JQA which is empty.
- \$Q21 REQUIRED JQA ADDR NOT PASSED TO \$DOGJQE**
- The \$DOGJQE service has been called to support an ACTION other than FETCH, FETCHNEXT, REFRESH or QUERYLOCK and there was no other JQA provided.



## \$HASP095

- \$Q22 \$DOGJQE CALLER USED OLD MACRO FORM**  
The \$DOGJQE service has been called by a routine which has not been reassembled using the latest version of the \$DOGJQE macro.
- \$Q23 CAT AND JOB CLASS DIFFER ON \$QBUSY**  
The CAT that the \$QBUSY service found (or the CAT passed into the service) does not match the execution class in the JQE. Either the wrong CAT was passed into the service or the current JQETYPE does not reflect the same job class as the JQXJCLAS field.
- \$Q24 ATTEMPT TO BUSY JOB THAT IS ALREADY ACTIVE**  
The \$QBUSY service was called to busy a JQE that was already marked as busy.
- \$Q25 ATTEMPT TO SET DCTDEVID WITH NO DCT**  
The \$QBUSY service was called to busy a JQE and set the active device identifier (JQEDEVID). However there is no DCT associated with the current PCE.
- \$Q26 INCORRECT OFFSET OR LENGTH FOR \$DOGJQE**  
\$DOGJQE ACTION=CKPTFLD not valid parameters.
- \$Q30 CHECKPOINT INFO FOR JIX CTENT OVERLAID**  
JES2 detected an overlay of the JIX CTENT.
- \$QG1 EXIT 49 ISSUED \$WAIT**  
Exit 49 rejected the JQE that was passed to it and also issued \$WAIT. Exit 49 can only \$WAIT if it does not reject the JQE.
- \$QG2 \$EXIT 14 DID NOT RETURN UPDATABLE JQA**  
Exit 14 gave a return code of 8 but failed to provide an update-mode JQA.
- \$R01** JES2 detected that \$SCQJQE does not contain a valid offset for shared communication queue JQE.
- \$RD1** NJE job header create table is full.
- \$RD2** NJE job header or trailer corrupted.
- \$REP** The required recovery routine specified on a \$PCTAB cannot be found.
- \$RT1 \$RETABLE INVALID TABLE ENTRY**  
The \$RETABLE service has located a table pair in which a dynamic table pointer does not point to a dynamic table. The probable cause is either a mismatch of levels of the \$MCT macro, or a failure to use the \$PAIR macro to define a table pair.
- \$S01** A GETMAIN for a permanent JES2 save area pool has failed.
- \$S02** The JES2 \$RETSAVE service routine has detected that the save area being returned is not on the calling processor's save area chain.
- \$S03** JES2 detected an incorrect spin \$IOT address while processing the first-in first-out (FIFO) spin \$IOT queue.
- \$SA1** The JOE or JQE currently found in the \$\$SAPID for this thread is not consistent with a previous SAP1 request made by this thread.
- \$SG1** While processing a request to get an SMF buffer, the SMF free count was about to go negative.
- \$SG2** While processing a request to get an SMF buffer, \$CPOOL services failed to return a cell. If recovery is attempted from this error, SMF processing will be turned off.
- \$SM1** JES2 detected a non-valid track address in module HASPSPOL during an I/O operation.
- \$SW1** JES2 detected an error while processing a scheduler JCL facility request.
- \$TK1** An incorrect checkpoint token was passed to the \$CHECK service routine. Because a recovery routine exists for this error, recovery will be attempted.
- \$TR1** The exclusive ENQ for the trace table, issued by the \$TRACE log processor, failed. The reason code is the return code from the ENQ macro.
- \$TR2** The trace log processor incurred a GETMAIN failure.
- \$U01** An installation exit routine issued a return code that is higher than the maximum return code value specified in the \$MAXRC parameter of the \$EXIT macro instruction.
- \$U03** A GETMAIN for the UCB parameter list failed.
- \$V01** The executing job is using unavailable spool space during a hot start of JES2.
- \$WL1 UNABLE TO DETERMINE WLM SERVICE ID**  
While processing the policy activation, JES2 received an unexpected return code from IWMPQRY. See message \$HASP712 to determine what return code was passed.
- \$WL2 UNRECOVERABLE CLASSIFICATION ERROR** While classifying a job, JES2 received an unexpected error return code from IWMCLSFY. See messages \$HASP712 to determine what return code was passed.
- \$WS1** The remote printer or punch device control table (DCT) you want cannot be found. The request is ended.

**\$WS2** The work selection service routine (WSSERV) did not receive the address of a required control block from the calling routine.

**RC=04** The JOE address was not found.

**RC=08** The JQE address was not found.

**RC=12** The JCT address was not found.

**RC=16** The data set header address was not found.

**RC=20** The UCT address was not found.

**RC=24** The DCT address was not found.

**\$WS3** No work selection (WS) tables were defined for a device.

**\$WS4** There was no slash found in either the installation work selection table or the HASP work selection table. A slash must be found in one of these tables for the selection criteria to be valid.

**\$X01** The spool offload channel-end routine (module HASPSTAM) found that I/O operations were not completing in order.

**\$X02** The spool offload channel-end routine (module HASPSTAM) found that the number of I/O completions exceeded the number of I/O operations issued.

**\$X03** GETMAIN failed to obtain the storage required for job control blocks during conversion processing.

**\$X04** **UNRECOVERABLE CLASSIFICATION ERROR SJB NO LONGER QUEUED TO CHAIN**An attempt has been made to dequeue an SJB that has already been dequeued.

**\$X05** The running processor incurred a GETMAIN failure.

**\$X06** Unable to obtain the SVJLOK resource. The return code from ENQ is in register 2.

**\$XC1** A JES2 XCF error has occurred. A previously displayed message(s) (\$HASP777 and \$HASP779) provides the reason for the JESXCF error.

**\$XC2** A JES XCF service returned an unexpected return code. The reason code associated with this error code is the return code from the JES XCF service. See *z/OS MVS Programming: JES Common Coupling Services* for an explanation of the return code and the associated programmer action.

**\$XF1** JES2 detected an error or unexpected return code from JESXCF.

**\$ZP1** **ZAP JOB QUEUE ERROR**

ZAPJOB processing has induced a job queue error. JES2 terminates. When restarting JES2, use the initialization form ZAPJOB to remove the offending job.

**\$Z03** An unrecoverable subtask abend has occurred.

**OCx** The JES2 abnormal exit routine has been entered, indicating that the JES2 system has been abnormally ended. X'0Cx' is the system completion code, where **x** = 1 through F. See the description of codes in *z/OS MVS System Codes*.

**System action:** If a JES2 recovery routine exists for this error, and the JES2 error rate has **not** reached or exceeded the value specified in the RECVOPTS initialization statement, JES2 issues an indicative dump (message \$HASP088) to the hard-copy log, and then invokes the recovery routine.

If a JES2 recovery routine exists for this error, and the JES2 error rate **has** reached or exceeded the value specified in the RECVOPTS initialization statement, JES2 issues message \$HASP070 and waits for the operator to reply.

If there is no JES2 recovery routine for this error, JES2 issues an indicative dump (message \$HASP088) and message \$HASP098 to the master console.

Even if a recovery routine exists, the following catastrophic errors cause JES2 to end: BR3, CF1, CF2, DP3, DP4, ER1, ER5, ER9, GS1, J09, J10, K04, K08, K20, K21, K22, K23, K24, PJF, PJ2, Q02, Q06, Q07, Q11, Q23, WS3, WS4, ZP1, and Z03

The following catastrophic errors require that the system be re-IPLed: \$K02, \$K03, \$K08, \$K15 (when \$K15 occurs after initialization) and \$V01.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer. Enter the appropriate response to message \$HASP098.

**System programmer response:** Use the indicative dump and the SVC dump (if any) to diagnose the error.

### 01 DATA SET NOT CLOSED

### 02 INVALID TRACK ADDRESS

JES2 detected that the track address of the next data block to be read is incorrect. It may be incorrect because a storage overlay of the track addressing field of the next spool block occurred before the block was written out. If BLOCK=1 is displayed, the error occurred in the control block pointing to the start of the data set (PDDB in the IOT). If BLOCK=1 is not displayed, the error occurred in a data block. If a dump is issued, the \$PCE contains the value of the incorrect track address in the PCESEEK field.

### 03 I/O READ ERROR

An I/O error occurred while JES2 was attempting to read the data block numbered *nnnn* for the specified data set. A hardware problem is the probable cause for the error.

### 04 INVALID JOB KEY

The job key field of the data block numbered *nnnn* does not match the current job key because the same spool address has been allocated to more than one job. This is most

likely caused by a JES2 abend after the JES2 checkpoint processor began to replenish the TGMs but before the next checkpoint write started.

### 05 INVALID DATA SET KEY

The data set key field of data block numbered *nnnn* does not match the current data set key. Allocation of the same spool address to more than one data set within a multi-tasking program is most likely caused by an error within the JES2 subsystem interface.

### 06 OBSOLETE OUTPUT ELEMENT

JES2 selected an output element that is ineligible for processing because its corresponding data set was already purged. The probable cause for this error is that, after a JES2 failure, the spin data set was purged without the JOE being removed.

### 07 AUTHORIZATION FAILED

The user identification associated with the output group is not eligible to use the device that selected this group.

### 08 BAD I/O FOR SWBIT READ

An I/O error occurred while JES2 was reading the SWBIT(s) for a data set during print separator processing. This is probably a hardware error.

### 09 NO DATA SET IN THE IOT

JES2 did not find a matching data set for the job output element (JOE) in the IOT during print/punch processing. This is probably an IOT chaining error.

**System action:** JES2 discontinues output processing on the device.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer.

1. The DELETE option appears only if there is an I/O error and both checkpoint data sets are in use (INUSE=YES). For example, if there is an error on CKPT1 and CKPT2 is not in use, JES2 **does not** present a DELETE option because its selection would leave no checkpoint data set in use.
2. If your JES2 configuration is running in DUPLEX mode and any member has specified DUPLEX=OFF, JES2 does not delete the CKPT1 data set unless it can allocate the DUPLEX data set (CKPT2) on every member. If allocation is successful, JES2 issues message \$HASP280 indicating the CKPT2 data set is in use and then suspends the use of CKPT1. If allocation is not successful on this member, JES2 issues the \$HASP278/\$HASP272 message pair. If allocation is not successful on a non-driving member(s), JES2 issues message \$HASP234 and \$HASP235.

### CKPTDEF (NO OPERANDS)

If you reply with a CKPTDEF statement with no operands, JES2 issues message \$HASP829 displaying the current settings of the CKPTDEF parameters that **can be modified** during a dialog. \$HASP289 is highlighted and is deleted after you reply to the \$HASP237/\$HASP272 message pair that JES2 reissues.

**Note:** If, during a reconfiguration dialog, you need to see the complete set of CKPTDEF specifications, issue the `$D CKPTDEF` command. JES2 responds by issuing message \$HASP829 showing only the CKPT1 and CKPT2 specifications.

Message \$HASP829 is issued displaying the current settings of the modifiable parameters on the CKPTDEF initialization statement. \$HASP289 is highlighted and is deleted after you reply to the next \$HASP272 message that JES2 issues.

JES2 assumes you specified a checkpoint and attempts to process it. If the specification is null, JES2 issues the \$HASP282/\$HASP272 message pair to request your checkpoint specification. Otherwise, JES2 issues the \$HASP273/\$HASP272 message pair to request confirmation of the checkpoint you specified.

**Note:** If a MAS member holding the shared spool is in abend recovery longer than the maximum time specified by the DELAY parameter, this message is issued on the "locked out" system.

#### **MESSAGE LIMIT, RC=02**

Another member of the MAS queued more messages to this system than allowed by the value of the MASMSG parameter of the CONDEF initialization statement of the sending system. This could indicate either a problem on the sending system or too low a value for the MASMSG parameter.

#### **MEMBER IN CHECKPOINT DIALOG, RC=03**

This member of the MAS is in checkpoint reconfiguration dialog. Commands and messages sent to other members of the MAS are immediately discarded to permit functions that are able to continue to do so.

#### **ERROR ON SPOOL, RC=04**

JES2 has tried to issue a message to a remote console. There were existing messages waiting to be sent, but they could not be accessed because the spool volume was unavailable.

**System action:** Processing continues.

**Operator response:** If **TIME LIMIT** appears in the message text, clear the hardware reserve on the checkpoint device by bringing down the system holding the lock. Clear 100 percent spool utilization by canceling input jobs or jobs that could be easily rerun, or add spool volumes to the configuration.

If **MESSAGE LIMIT** appears in the message text, determine which system in the MAS is sending the messages. Determine if that system is looping or if there is an application that is sending many notifications to the system that issued this message.

If **MEMBER IN CHECKPOINT DIALOG** appears in the message text, answer the console prompts for the checkpoint reconfiguration dialog for that member.

If **ERROR ON SPOOL** appears in the message text, the old messages are discarded and a new remote message data set will be created that contains any new messages.

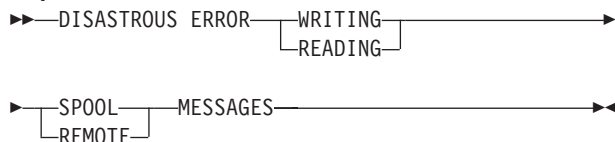

1. For cause 1, correct the clock values on the system in error with the older clock value. IPL to set the TOD clock and perform a single system warm start.
2. For cause 2, evaluate the \$HASP094 explanation. Consider evaluating the disk surface for bad cylinders in the SYS1.HASPACE data set or consider possible spool contamination (logical error in processing on spool).
3. For cause 3, see the \$Q02 explanation under \$HASP095. To ensure a clean recovery from a \$Q02 abend, perform an all-member warm start of JES2.

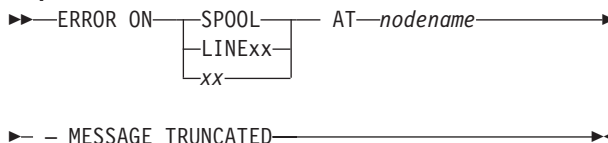

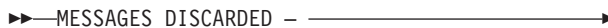

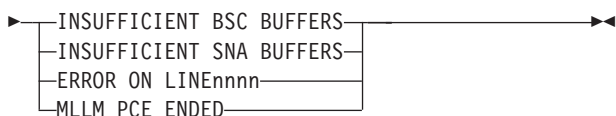

### INSUFFICIENT BSC BUFFERS

There are insufficient BSC buffers to accommodate the number of concurrently active functions.

### INSUFFICIENT SNA BUFFERS

There are insufficient SNA buffers to accommodate the number of concurrently active functions.

### ERROR ON LINEnnnn

Line errors are extremely frequent, causing all buffers to wait for transmission, or the receiving system is congested and cannot receive.

### MLLM PCE ENDED

The multi-leaving line manager (MLLM) PCE has terminated abnormally, causing JES2 to not be able to issue messages across NJE lines. JES2 previously issued message \$HASP068 to indicate this condition.

In some cases, JES2 might disconnect some communication lines to free the buffer resources and inform the other end of the line concerning the abnormal conditions. This condition is followed by appropriate disconnect messages.

**System action:** Processing continues.

**System programmer response:** If the problem appears in the receiving system, inform the remote installation and prepare a plan to reduce congestion. For example, reduce message flow by altering connection resistances (REST= parameter on the LINE(nnnn) initialization statement), provide more resources to handle NJE traffic, or install new lines to bypass congested system.

If appropriate, provide more buffers for transmission. Use the BSCBUF= and SNABUF= parameters on the TPDEF initialization statement for BSC and SNA buffers, respectively.

If the condition occurs as a result of the suspension of the MLLM PCE, you need to restart JES2 to restore normal line operation.

If excessive line errors continue, inform your hardware maintenance personnel.

7. The delayed member has not yet detected an expected XCF user state update by the causing member.

For all causes above, the delay can be temporary and reconfiguration processing continues if the respective activity completes. If temporary, consider this an informational message for those conditions.

For causes e, f, and g, one or more members may have caused reconfiguration processing to not proceed. These delays can be permanent.

**System action:** In general, the JES2 checkpoint reconfiguration is delayed until the expected XCF user state update is detected or JES XCF application or acknowledgment message is received. If the delaying member eventually responds or fails, the \$HASP257 message is deleted and processing continues. Specific system actions are provided for each *action-code* and *action-text*.

**Operator response:** There are certain general actions you might take for all *action-codes* and *action-texts* are

noted here. Specific actions are also provided for each *action-code* and *action-text*.

**General Approach for All Action Codes:** Before JES2 can continue with the checkpoint reconfiguration, you must first resolve any outstanding sysplex partition problems.

If the \$HASP257 message(s) persists, you must issue \$PJES2,ABEND followed by \$PJES2,ABEND,FORCE to remove the problem member(s) from the MAS and wait for the reconfiguration to end before restarting the failed members. To determine which member is actually causing the problem, consider:

1. If the driving member is waiting for one (or more) non-driving members, **and** all the other non-driving members are waiting on the driving member, then the member(s) for which the driving member is waiting is likely the cause of the delay.
2. If the driving member has not issued \$HASP257, and all the other non-driving members issued \$HASP257 indicating a delay, then the member causing the delay is likely the driving member.

If you can isolate the most likely member(s) causing the delay:

1. Terminate the member(s). (You cannot issue \$PJES2,ABEND,FORCE unless you have first attempted to terminate the member with the \$PJES2,ABEND command.)
2. Try to not terminate the driving member unless necessary. It holds the latest (most current) copy of the checkpoint data. However, terminate the driving member before terminating **all** non-driving members.

These recommendations require that you have an overall view of the status of the MAS. Obtain this overall view from message \$HASP255 which identifies the driving member and the set of \$HASP254 and \$HASP257 messages from all members. You can use a single command to display the set of \$HASP257 messages if the CONDEF CONCHAR= is defined as the same character on every JES2 member of the MAS. For example, if CONCHAR=\$ is specified on every member, issue the MVS command *D R,L,CN=(ALL),MSG=\$HASP257*.

The *action-code* and corresponding *action-text* are:

Code	Text
1	<i>causing-member-name</i> TO INDICATE RECONFIGURATION STARTING

**Explanation:** The causing member has not updated its XCF user-state information to indicate it has started checkpoint reconfiguration processing.

**System Action:** If the cause is temporary, processing continues when the reason for delay is processed.

**Operator Response:** If the causing member is on an MVS system that is a candidate for partitioning or is being partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes. As appropriate, you can:

- Request that MVS partition the system out of the sysplex
- Wait for partitioning processing to end
- Terminate the *causing-member*.

In rare situations, you may be able to end the delay by issuing a *\$D CKPTDEF* command to the *causing-member*. If the response does not indicate RECONFIG=YES, issue *\$T CKPTDEF,RECONFIG=Yes* (the blank between \$T and CKPTDEF is optional) to the causing member. If this does not initiate the checkpoint reconfiguration on the *causing-member*, issue *\$PJES2,ABEND* followed by *\$PJES2,ABEND,FORCE*. Restart the JES2 member after reconfiguration processing completes.

2 *causing-member-name* TO COMMIT AS THE DRIVING MEMBER

**Explanation:** The driving member has not updated its XCF user-state information to indicate it has committed as the driving member for this checkpoint reconfiguration.

**System Action:** If the driving member is on an MVS system about to be partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes. The member with the next highest level of checkpoint data takes over the role as driving member.

**Operator Response:** If the driving member also issued one or more \$HASP257 messages, respond to those before taking action to satisfy this message. If the driving member did not also issue a \$HASP257 message(s), the driving member may be the cause of the problem. See General Approach for All Action Codes on page 105.

3 *causing-member-name* TO COMMIT AS NON-DRIVING MEMBER

**Explanation:** The non-driving member has not updated its XCF user-state information to indicate it has committed to this checkpoint reconfiguration.

**System Action:** If the non-driving member is on an MVS system about to be partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination

processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes.

**Operator response:** If the delay is not temporary (such as because of partitioning or termination processing), you need to fail (terminate) the causing member. See General Approach for All Action Codes on page 105.

4 JESXCF APPLICATION MESSAGE (CKXMTYPE=*msg-type*) FROM DRIVING MEMBER *causing-member-name*

**Explanation:** The non-driving member has not received a JESXCF application message of the indicated CKXMTYP=*msg-type* from the driving member.

**System Action:** If the non-driving member is on an MVS system about to be partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes.

**Operator response:** If the driving member also issued one or more \$HASP257 messages, respond to those before taking action to satisfy this message. If the driving member did not also issue a \$HASP257 message(s), the driving member may be the cause of the problem. See General Approach for All Action Codes on page 105.

5 JESXCF ACKNOWLEDGEMENT MESSAGE (CKXMTYPE=*msg-type*) FROM NON-DRIVING MEMBER *causing-member-name*

**Explanation:** The driving member has not received a JESXCF acknowledgment message of the indicated CKXMTYP=*msg-type* from the non-driving member.

**System Action:** If the non-driving member is on an MVS system about to be partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes.

**Operator Response:** If the delay is not temporary (such as because of partitioning or termination processing), you need to fail (terminate) the causing, non-driving member. See General Approach for All Action Codes on page 105.

6 *causing-member-name* TO DECOMMIT AS THE DRIVING MEMBER

**Explanation:** The non-driving member is waiting for the driving member to update its XCF user-state to decommit as the driving member.

**System Action:** If the driving member is on an MVS system about to be partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes.

**Operator response:** If the driving member also issued one or more \$HASP257 messages, respond to those before taking action to satisfy this message. If the driving member did not also issue a \$HASP257 message(s), the driving member may be the cause of the problem. See General Approach for All Action Codes on page 105.

**7** *causing-member-name* TO DECOMMIT THIS RECONFIGURATION

**Explanation:** The *delayed-member* is waiting for the *causing-member* to update its XCF user-state to indicate that the *causing-member* has decommitted this reconfiguration. Because reconfiguration processing is completing, there is no longer a *driving member*.

**System Action:** If the *causing-member* is on an MVS system about to be partitioned out of the sysplex or the member is in termination processing, then checkpoint reconfiguration processing resumes after that processing completes.

**Operator Response:** If the delay is not temporary (such as because of partitioning or termination processing), you need to fail (terminate) the *causing-member*. See General Approach for All Action Codes on page 105.

**System programmer response:** None.

JES2 issues this message when operator input is needed to determine the correct action for JES2 to take and the explanation cannot be placed in a WTOR. JES2 issues a highlighted message (WTO) followed by the \$HASP272 WTOR. The information needed to reply to the \$HASP272 message is contained in the preceding

message. The text of the preceding message can be obtained from MVS by using the D R,L command or, if the long form of the \$HASP272 message is issued, the MVS D R,MSG=\$HASPxxx command that is displayed in the message.

IBM suggests:

- If the D R,MSG=id response includes "NOARMF", then turn on ARMF by issuing the following command: K M,ARMF=Y This allows the display of future action messages. Also, you should update your CONSOLxx parmlib member to set on ARMF.
- Reply with "CKPTDEF". This is frequently a valid option that doesn't change anything. However, if it is not a valid reply, JES2 will issue an error message and then reissue the original message.

**System action:** JES2 waits for the operator's reply.

**Operator response:** The information needed to reply to the HASP272 message is contained in the preceding message. The text of the preceding message can be obtained from MVS by using the D R,L command or, if the long form of the HASP272 message is issued, the MVS D R,MSG=\$HASPxxx command that is displayed in the message.

If **NEWCKPTn** is displayed, JES2 is about to replace the data set name and volume serial or the coupling facility structure name of the specified checkpoint data set (CKPT1 or CKPT2) with the specifications assigned

to **NEWCKPT***n*. JES2 requests the operator to verify or change the action to be taken. If the specifications are not what you require, change them by replying to the \$HASP272 message with the CKPTDEF (WITH OPERANDS) option, or select a new action.

If **NEWCKPT***n* is not displayed, the specified checkpoint data set (CKPT1 or CKPT2) is being placed into service. JES2 is about to assign the checkpoint data set to data set name *dsname* on volume *volser* or coupling facility structure name *strname*, based on an explicit request (option 7 or 8) given to the \$HASP271/\$HASP272 message pair. JES2 requests the operator to verify or change the action to be taken. If the specifications are not what you require, change them by replying to the \$HASP272 message with the CKPTDEF (WITH OPERANDS) option, or select a new action.

Not all of the options appear for a given instance of this message.

In the message text:

**n** The number of the checkpoint or new checkpoint data set (either 1 or 2).

**dsname** The name of the new checkpoint data set.

**volser** The volume identifier.

**System action:** JES2 issues message \$HASP272 and waits for an operator response.

A reply of TERM causes **all** members experiencing an I/O error on CKPT*n* to end abnormally with a \$Kxx error code. The reason code on the \$HASP275 message for each member is the \$HASP095 error code for each member. Depending on the \$Kxx reason code given in the \$HASP275 message and the subsequent \$HASP095 error code, the TERM response may require an IPL or an all-member warm start. Although JES2 attempts to create an emergency backup copy of this data set before ending (see message \$HASP279), it may not be successful.

**DELETE**

JES2 reformats the other CKPT*n* data set (for example, CKPT2, if CKPT1 is displayed) and then deallocates the CKPT*n* data set specified in this message (\$HASP273). JES2 continues processing with only one checkpoint data set in use.

**Notes:**

1. The DELETE option appears only if there is an I/O error on this member and both checkpoint data sets are in use (INUSE=YES). For example, if there is an error on CKPT1 and CKPT2 is not active, there is no DELETE option because that would leave no active checkpoint data set.
2. If your JES2 configuration is running in DUPLEX mode and any member has specified DUPLEX=OFF, JES2 does not delete the CKPT1 data set unless it can allocate the DUPLEX data set (CKPT2) on every member. If allocation is successful, JES2 issues message \$HASP280 indicating the CKPT2 data set is in use and then suspends the use of CKPT1. If allocation is not successful on this member, JES2 issues the \$HASP278/\$HASP272 message pair. If allocation is not successful on a non-driving member(s), JES2 issues message \$HASP234 and \$HASP235.

**CKPTDEF**

If you reply with a CKPTDEF statement with no operands, JES2 issues message \$HASP829 displaying the current settings of the CKPTDEF parameters that **can be modified** during a dialog. \$HASP289 is highlighted and is deleted after you reply to the \$HASP273/\$HASP272 message pair that JES2 reissues.

**Note:** If, during a reconfiguration dialog, you need to see the complete set of CKPTDEF specifications, issue the \$D CKPTDEF command. If you only

This message is issued with *VOLUME FOR CKPT $n$  NOT MOUNTED*. If the operator again sets the data set to INUSE=NO and replies 'CONT', JES2 reissues this message. This message will be continually re-issued because the saved information says that the data set is INUSE=YES. To start JES2 in this situation, you must reply 'RECONFIG' or restart JES2 by specifying

- If the checkpoint resides on DASD, the data set name *dsname* does not exist on volume *volser* specified on the CKPTDEF initialization statement.
- If the data set resides on a coupling facility, the structure *strname* is unusable.
- The reason identified in one of the previous messages. If the checkpoint resides on a coupling facility, structure, the \$HASP536 message would have preceded this message.

A data set residing on DASD might be rejected because:

- The data set is too small

-- or --

- An I/O error occurred while JES2 was reading the volume table of contents (VTOC).

A coupling facility structure name is rejected if it does not have a coupling facility resource management (CFRM) policy.

Not all of the options appear for a given instance of this message.

In the message text:

**n** The number of the checkpoint or new checkpoint data set. The number is either 1 or 2.

#### dsname

The name of the checkpoint data set.

#### volser

The volume identifier.

#### strname

The name of the coupling facility structure.

**System action:** JES2 issues message \$HASP272 and waits for an operator response.

**Operator response:** Determine the action you want to take and respond to message \$HASP272 with one of the options described below. Not all of the options appear for a given instance of this message.

#### Option Meaning

##### CANCEL

**Note:** If, during a reconfiguration dialog, you need to see the complete set of CKPTDEF specifications, issue the \$D CKPTDEF command. If you only need to see specific parameter settings (for example, CKPT1 and CKPT2), issue the \$D CKPTDEF,CKPT1,CKPT2 command. JES2 responds by issuing message \$HASP829 showing only the CKPT1 and CKPT2 specifications.

**JOB NUMBERS ABOVE THAT SUPPORTED BY REL4 ARE IN USE**

Either JES2 was warm started with PARM=UNACT or a \$ACTIVATE,LEVEL=R4 command was issued and job numbers above 65534 are in use. Since

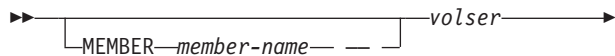

All continuation cards pertaining to this initialization parameter statement should be examined for errors because this message displays only the first continuation card, not necessarily the continuation card(s) that have errors (bad parameters).

This message is followed by the \$HASP467 message, which forces JES2 initialization into console mode. The \$HASP467 message contains the diagnostic; the \$HASP469 reply message gives the operator an opportunity to correct the initialization statement in error. - JES2 has not yet loaded the module specified on a statement.
- The installation used incorrect delimiters to separate fields on a statement.
- The statement does not contain enough fields.
- The module name exceeds eight characters.

**COMMAND LENGTH ERROR**

A command in the JES2 initialization deck exceeds 132 characters.

**COMMENT ERROR**

A command in the JES2 initialization deck contains an invalid comment.

See message \$HASP003 for more information.

**System action:** Processing continues.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer. (See message \$HASP469.)

**System programmer response:** Correct the problem identified in the diagnostic message.

The variable text and reason code indicate the type of error that occurred.

*text* is one of the following:

#### NJE DEVICES UNAVAILABLE, RC=01

**Explanation:** No NJE function device control tables were available to perform data-stream transmission over the connection.

**System action:** JES2 rejects the signon and continues processing.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer.

**System programmer response:** Increase the value of the LINENUM parameter on the NJEDEF initialization statement; this requires a JES2 warm start.

#### INVALID LINE PASSWORD, RC=02

**Explanation:** The line password was not valid.

**System programmer response:** Examine trace identifier 24 to determine the source of the record and if the connection as defined at the source node needs to be corrected.

### INVALID NCC RECORD, RC=08

**Explanation:** The network connection control (NCC) record contained an incorrect length. The length field contains either a zero value or a length value that extends the current record beyond the end of the data buffer. This message may indicate hardware I/O errors or that an incorrect record was built by another node or MAS member.

**System action:** JES2 purges the data buffer and schedules the line for signoff.

**Operator response:** Reestablish the connection with

the proper \$S N command. (See *z/OS JES2 Commands*). If the problem continues, notify the system programmer.

**System programmer response:** Examine incoming data buffers on this line to determine if the session partner is violating SNA protocols.

### LINE NOT TRANSPARENT, RC=09

### NECESSARY STORAGE NOT AVAILABLE, RC=10

**Operator response:** Either increase the value of the NJEDEF TIMETOL parameter or correct the time on one of the two systems involved.

**Explanation:** JES2 received a status record on line *lna* for a connection between 2 nodes where either the primary or secondary member number is not valid.

The member number specified in the record.

**System action:** JES2 rejects the record.

**Operator response:** Notify the system programmer.

**System programmer response:** Examine trace identifier 24 to identify the source of the record in error and isolate the member transmitting the erroneous records.

The member must equal 1 for JES2 nodes at JES2 Version 5 and OS/390.

**Detecting Module:** HASPNPM

**FUTURE CES BETWEEN nodea AND nodeb, RC=13**

**Explanation:** JES2 received a connection record with a CES value that exceeds the value specified on the TIMETOL parameter of the NJEDEF initialization statement.

The nodes represented on the connection record.

**System action:** JES2 rejects the connection record.

**System programmer response:** Examine trace identifier 24, which contains the rejected record for the nodes and members involved.

**UNSUPPORTED SIGNON FEATURES, RC=14**

**Explanation:** A node attempted to signon to this node, requesting a feature not supported by line vvvvvvvv.

### INCORRECT MULTI-TRUNK PROTOCOL, RC=18

**Explanation:** During NJE signon processing, JES2 determines that the two nodes do not agree that this is the first line to connect the two nodes. Either the issuing node has:

- multiple lines to the other node, but the network connection control (NCC) record indicates this is the first line or
- no other line to the other node, but the NCC record indicates that this is not the first line.

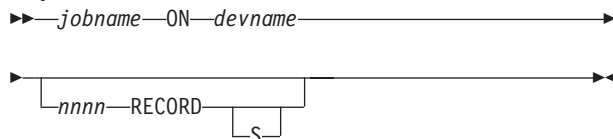

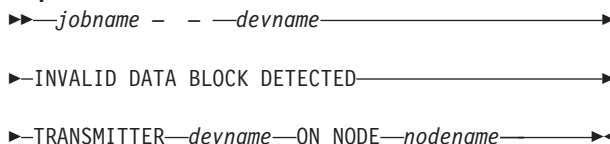

JES2 creates the connection name by concatenating the string 'JES2\_' with the name of the local member as specified on either the OWNMEMB= parameter of the MASDEF initialization statement or the default name specified as the SID specification in the MVS SMFPRMnn PARMLIB member.

**System programmer response:** Ensure that the value specified on the OWNMEMB= parameter is valid and contains characters that are valid as a XES connection name. Correct the OWNMEMB= value if necessary and allow JES2 to attempt to reconnect the member. For MASDEF OWNMEMB= naming convention information, see *MVS/ESA SP V5 JES2 Init and Tuning Reference* and for the SMFPRMnn PARMLIB member, see *z/OS MVS Initialization and Tuning Reference*.



**14. ERROR BUILDING LEID TABLE DURING CF ALLOCATE**

**Explanation:** A read of the LEID table failed during coupling facility allocation processing.

**System programmer response:** Contact the IBM support center.

**System action:** JES2 enters the checkpoint reconfiguration dialog where the operator is prompted to change the checkpoint specification, delete the structure, or change CFRM policies. In many instances, if you delete the structure through the SETXCF commands and then reconnect to it, the structure might be usable.

**COMPACT**

Specifies when this printer is incrementing the copy marks. This keyword is **DATASET** for impact printers.

This keyword only applies for local printers.

**CREATOR**

Specifies the user identification that created the output that this device is selecting. If this keyword is not explicitly set, the value is blank.

This keyword only applies for local and remote printers and punches.

**DEVFCB**

Specifies the 1- to 4-character name of the forms control buffer (FCB) that this printer is using as a default. If this keyword is not explicitly set, the value is blank.

**EJECT={YESINO}**

This keyword is blank for impact printers.

This keyword only applies for local printers.

### FLUSH={YESINO}

Specifies whether JES2 punches a blank card following each data set or data set copy processed by this device.

This keyword only applies to remote punches.

### FORMS

Specifies the 1- to 8-character forms identifiers that are loaded on this device. There can be up to 8 forms identifiers loaded.

This keyword only applies for local and remote printers.

### FSAROLTR={YESINO}

Specifies whether the internal rolling trace for an FSS printer is active for this device.

### FSS

The name of the FSS that controls this printer.

This keyword only applies to local printers.

### HOLD={YESINO}

Specifies whether jobs entering the system on this device are to be held until the operator releases the job for processing.

For lines, this keyword specifies whether JES2 is holding a particular network transmitter or receiver.

This keyword only applies to local and remote readers and lines.

### HONORTRC={YESINO}

In the message, *reason* is one of the following:

**Operator Response:** After the problem has been corrected, restart the printer using the \$S PRTnnnn command. (A residual FSS ASID may need to be canceled using the MVS CANCEL command.)

**System Programmer Response:** Correct the JDT library. After a warm start, this device can be a functional subsystem-managed device.

### **PROCESSING TO START FSS FAILED**

SVC 34 through the MGCR macro failed.

**System Programmer Response:** Determine why SVC 34 failed using the return code in the accompanying \$HASP703 message. For a description of the return code, see *z/OS MVS Programming: Assembler Services Reference ABE-HSP*.

### **FSS FAILED TO CONNECT**

The functional subsystem did not connect within a predetermined amount of time. This could be caused by a JCL error in the procedure to start the functional subsystem or by problems in the functional subsystem.

**System Programmer Response:** This message is accompanied by the \$HASP703 message or other messages indicating the error condition. Use the accompanying messages to correct the problem.

Do the following:

- Save the console sheet from the primary console.
- Issue the LIST CDS and LIST PTFBY functions of SMP/E, if SMP/E is used to make all changes to the system. Use the LISTIDR function of the AMBLIST service aid program to obtain a list of all members with a PTF or local fix, if any changes are made to the system without SMP/E.
- Save all of the output associated with the problem.
- Contact the IBM Support Center for assistance.

### **FSA FAILED TO CONNECT**

The functional subsystem application did not connect because of an error in the functional subsystem.

**System Programmer Response:** This message is accompanied by the \$HASP703 message or other messages indicating the error condition. Use the accompanying information to correct the problem.

Do the following:

- Save the console sheet from the primary console.
- Issue the LIST CDS and LIST PTFBY functions of SMP/E, if SMP/E is used to make all changes to the system. Use the LISTIDR function of the AMBLIST service aid program to obtain a list of all members with a PTF or local fix, if any changes are made to the system without SMP/E.
- Save all of the output associated with the problem.
- Contact the IBM Support Center for assistance.

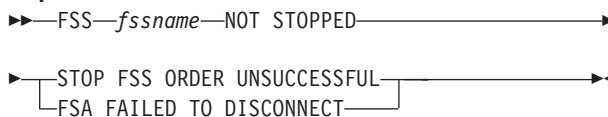

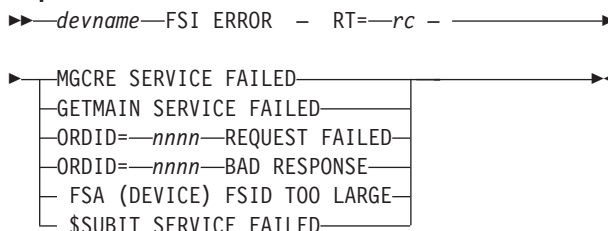

The \$SUBIT service was used to issue the start command; however, it was unable to complete the request. **RT=rc** indicates the \$SUBIT return code.

**System action:** The system action depends upon the current processing being performed. If the service failure is detected during functional subsystem (FSS) start, drain, or stop processing, this message is typically followed by \$HASP700, \$HASP701, or \$HASP702. Refer to this accompanying message for the system action taken. If the failure is detected during functional subsystem interface (FSI) order (JES2 command) processing, this message is followed by \$HASP152, and system operation continues.

An attempt was made to allocate a load module table entry for the displayed load module, but no storage was available. There is no logical limit on the number of entries, except the amount of available storage.

increasing the common storage area (CSA) for the system.

### MODULE COULD NOT BE LOADED, RC=02

**Explanation:** An attempt to load the module failed. The module is probably not in the correct library (STEPLIB, LINKLIST, or LPA).

**System programmer response:** Place the module in the appropriate library from which JES2 can successfully load it.

### MODULE IS NOT REENTRANT, RC=03

**Explanation:** Because the module is not reentrant, it could not be loaded into the common storage area (CSA).

**System programmer response:** Ensure that the code in the module is reentrant. Use the linkage editor to mark it reentrant for JES2 load processing.

### NEW CSA/LPA LOADMODS INVALID ON HOT START, RC=04

**Explanation:** On this JES2 hot start, an attempt was made to either load a module into CSA or to load a module that was in LPA. New common storage modules cannot be loaded on a hot start because the existing modules may be in use for common storage exits and the exit routines cannot be changed.

**System programmer response:** If it is necessary to load new common storage modules or replace existing ones, perform a warm start of JES2.

### INSUFFICIENT STORAGE TO LOAD MODULE, RC=05

**Explanation:** A request was made to load a module into CSA, but no CSA storage was available.

**System programmer response:** Resolve the lack of storage by either increasing the CSA for the system or by freeing other CSA uses.

### MODULE IS INVALID, RMODE MUST BE 24, RC=06

**Explanation:** The module being loaded is marked as RMODE 31 and resides above 16 megabytes in virtual storage. All JES2 code must be marked RMODE 24.

**System programmer response:** Regenerate the module with RMODE 24.

### MODULE NAME DOES NOT MATCH ITS MIT,EXPECTED-mit\_exp ACTUAL-mit\_act, RC=07

**Explanation:** During module verification, a JES2-format module was checked to ensure its load module name matched the name in the module information table (MIT). The check failed.

**Note:** No JES2 uses of \$MODCHK specify that this type of check should be done at this time; the programmer specified this verification.

**System programmer response:** Rename the load



module to match the name in the MIT.

**MODULE VERSION IS INVALID, EXPECTED-ver\_exp ACTUAL-ver\_act, RC=08**

**Explanation:** The version number in the module information table (MIT) for this module does not match the version of the JES2 release that is running.

**System programmer response:** Reassemble the module at the same version level as the JES2 release currently running.

**MODULE ASSEMBLED WITH INVALID MACRO LIBRARIES, EXPECTED-lib\_exp ACTUAL-lib\_act, RC=09**

**Explanation:** The module was assembled with a set of MVS macro libraries different from the set used to assemble the JES2 system that is running (for example MVS/ESA rather than z/OS).

**System programmer response:** Reassemble the module with the correct macro library level.

**MODULE IS NOT IN COMMON STORAGE, RC=10**

**Explanation:** The \$MODCHK routine determined that this module is not in common storage. This error should not occur with the modules that JES2 loads because it forces these modules into CSA if they are not in LPA.

**System programmer response:** Either place the module in LPA, or change your exit \$MODLOAD calls to request that the module be placed in CSA.

**MODULE MIT IS INVALID, CANNOT LOCATE LMT, RC=11**

**MODULE MIT IS INVALID, MODULE TOO SMALL, RC=11**

**MODULE MIT IS INVALID, INCORRECT MITETBL ADDRESS, RC=11**

**MODULE MIT IS INVALID, INCORRECT EYECATCHER, EXPECTED-mit ACTUAL-mit, RC=11**

**Explanation:** The module information table (MIT) for the module is not valid for one or more of the following reasons:

- The module is not long enough to contain a module information table.
- The module does not begin with CL4'MIT'.
- The MITETBL pointer to the MIT entry table, which is generated at the end of the module, points to an address outside the range of the module.

**System programmer response:** Reassemble the module with the correct JES2 module structure, using a \$MODULE macro to start the module (and generate the MIT), and a \$MODEND macro to end the module (and generate the MITETBL).

**MODULE NOT FOUND – MODULE CANNOT BE VERIFIED, RC=12**

**Explanation:** No verification checks were done by

\$MODCHK because the address operand was not coded on the \$MODCHK macro and the entry point was not found in the load module table (\$LMT).

**Note:** This is probably because JES2 or an installation exit called \$MODCHK before a successful \$MODLOAD was performed.

**System programmer response:** Either code the ADDR= parameter for load modules when calling \$MODCHK or ensure the JES2 load module was loaded successfully by \$MODLOAD.

**INVALID TIME FRAME TO LOAD TO CSA/LPA, RC=14**

**Explanation:** A \$MODLOAD call was made for the named module. It is not possible to load modules into common storage this early in JES2 initialization. This can occur if Exit 0 is found in LPA (not STEPLIB/LINKLIST) or when installation of Exit 0 issues \$MODLOAD TYPE=JES2 and the requested module is found in LPA.

**System programmer response:** If you must load installation modules into CSA early in initialization, either use a LOADMOD initialization statement early in your initialization stream, or call \$MODLOAD in an early call to exit 19 during parameter processing by \$SCAN.

**MODULE USER VERSION IS INVALID EXPECTED-uver\_exp ACTUAL-uver\_act, RC=15**

**Explanation:** The module user version character string for this module in the module information table (as defined by &UVERS in \$HASPGBL), does not match the version of the JES2 release that is running.

**System programmer response:** Reassemble the module at the same version level as the JES2 release currently running.

**MODULE IBM USER VERSION IS INVALID, RC=16**

**Explanation:** The user version character string for this module in the module information table (MIT) does not match the IBM-defined value.

**System programmer response:** Ensure that the object deck is at the correct maintenance level. If the object deck is at the correct maintenance level and the error persists, contact your IBM support representative.

**MODULE \$ENTRY ADDRESS TABLE OFFSET(S) NOT VALID, RC=17**

**Explanation:** An IBM module was loaded into common storage during JES2 initialization saving the service routine's entry point address information. At least one entry point was defined (through the \$ENTRY macro) to have its address placed at an invalid offset within the CADDR control block.

**System programmer response:** Ensure that the module being loaded to common storage matches the version of JES2 code currently performing JES2 initialization.

If you suspect a problem, obtain a dump of the JES2 address space. If you determine symptoms other than this message and are unable to determine the cause, contact the IBM Support Center.

In that case, JES2 should release the lock within approximately one minute.

Determine where the PCE is waiting. If in an exit module, verify the logic in that module. Possibly the JES2 member that holds the lock is not functioning and needs to be restarted. If this is the case, restart JES2 on the member that holds the lock. Further checking into the PCE that is waiting for the lock might also be required. Because PCEs should not wait for BERT locks except in rare situations, examine the \$HASP9205 message for an exit number. If there is an exit number present, examine the exit to determine if it can wait for a BERT lock, either directly or by calling a service that gets the BERT lock with WAIT=YES. Then

determine is that is appropriate processing or if the exit should bypass jobs that are locked.

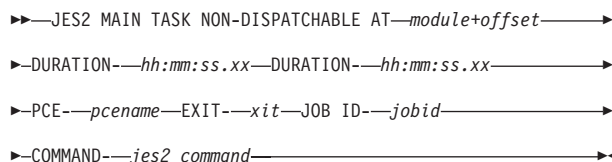

## Appendix A. PCE list

The \$HASP069 message provides an indication that JES2 is running in a "partial recovery status" mode. When a "not required" PCE fails, JES2 still processes work. That is, upon recovery, JES2 has lost functions associated with PCE processing. When a "required" PCE fails, JES2 fails and terminates.

Contact the system programmer to determine if continued processing is acceptable at an installation level and then diagnose the problem. The following table contains a list of PCEs, their names, whether they are required, and a description of their function.

PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
Acquire Lock and Initiate Cleanup Executor (ALICE)	N	This PCE is responsible for finishing warmstart for individual jobs which failed to be recovered during normal warmstart processing because of BERT lock or BERT shortage conditions. If this PCE is ended, then these jobs will not be warmstarted on this member. If there are other members, then the ALICE PCE on those members will perform the function.
ARM Support Processor (RESTART)	N	This PCE is responsible for handling Automatic Restart Management (ARM) requests from other address spaces. These requests are handled synchronously by the JES2 address space. If the ARM PCE is ended, jobs that use ARM may hang in ARM registration/deregistration.
ASYNCR I/O Processor (ASYNCR)	Y	Handles I/O completions for SPOOL, unit record devices, and BSC lines.
BERT Lock Post Processor (BERTLOCK)	N	Handles requests for jobs that are currently locked. If one PCE of this type is ended, then the other PCEs will pick up the work of that PCE. There should be minimal impact to performance. If all PCEs of this type are terminated, then work in the SYSPLEX may hang.
Checkpoint Processor (CKPT)	Y	Performs all I/O to the checkpoint data set. It is also responsible for the checkpoint reconfiguration process.
Command Processor (COMM)	Y	Handles all JES2 commands for this member.
Distributed Available Work Notification Processor (DAWN)	N	This PCE performs the appropriate \$#POSTing of all jobs that have space allocated to the spool volume being started. JES2 might not pick up output on a volume that is started for processing. A \$\$ command or a \$\$ dev command causes output to be selected.
Elapsed Time Monitor (TIME)	N	This PCE is responsible for monitoring the execution time for jobs and issuing the \$HASP308 message if the estimated time is exceeded. If this PCE is ended, then the \$HASP308 message is never issued.
End of Memory Processor (EOM)	N	This PCE is responsible for freeing resources associated with jobs that do not terminate normally and still own JES2 resources at the end of memory. If all PCEs of this type are ended, then these jobs will remain in execution, from a JES2 perspective, and JES2 resources held by these jobs will not be released.

ENF Listen Processor (ENF)	N	Listens for ENFs from WLM to indicate a change in scheduling environment, WLM policy activation, and MVS service class resets. If this PCE is ended, then JES2 will be unaware of any policy activations and scheduling environment changes. This could cause jobs to hang on this member.
Event Trace Log (EVTL)	N	Manages the JES2 \$TRCLOG data set. It converts trace information from JES2 trace buffers in SYSOUT associated with the \$TRCLOG job. If this PCE is ended, then no trace data can be recorded to the \$TRCLOG data set.
Execution Services (EXEC)	Y	Responsible for placing jobs, STCs and TSUs into execution and processing their normal and abnormal termination (including re-queuing jobs to be executed again).
FSS Cleanup at EOM (FCLEANUP)	N	Handles cleaning up FSS address spaces that go through end of memory without performing normal address space termination. If this PCE is ended, then FSS printers that go through the end of memory will hang.

If JES2 is not restarted, ECSA usage will increase and eventually you might need to do an IPL.

If this PCE is ended, requests from other members can not be processed. This will have little impact on JES2 operations. However, messages sent to this PCE will accumulate in JESXCF and could eventually result in JESXCF ABENDs.

PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
Job Priority Aging (PRTY)	N	This PCE updates the priority of JOBS on your system in accordance with the JOBDEF initialization statement. Priority aging only occurs on the lowest numbered active member of a MAS. If this PCE is ended, and this is the lowest active member, then priority aging of JOBS will stop. If this is not the lowest active member or if a lower numbered member is started, then there is no impact of this processor ending. SYSOUT priority aging is not affected.
Job Route Receiver (NET.RR)	N	This PCE (with the job route transmitter) handles jobs that are on the NJE transmit queue but are routed locally. This normally occurs when a \$R XEQ command is used to change a network routed job to the local node. If this PCE is ended, then the job it is processing is typically hung. Other jobs can be processed by the job route transmitter/receiver on other MAS members.
Job Route Transmitter (NET.RT)	N	This PCE (with the job route receiver) handles jobs that are on the NJE transmit queue but are routed locally. This normally occurs when a \$R XEQ command is used to change a network routed job to the local node. If this PCE is ended, then the job it is processing is typically hung. Other jobs can be processed by the job route transmitter/receiver on other MAS members.
JQE Request processor (JQRP)	N	This PCE processes requests for JQEs from other address spaces other than the JES2 address space. If a JQRB PCE is ended, the job it was processing will remain in its current state and the requesting task (internal reader or NJE/TCP receiver) might hang. If all the JQRB PCEs on a system end, you can submit jobs through internal readers, NJE/TCP job receivers will no longer be able to accept new jobs, and request jobid processing hangs.
Line Manager (MLLM)	N	Handles all BSC and SNA communication (NJE and RJE). If this PCE is ended, then all NJE and RJE communications stop.
MAS Command Processor (JCMD)	Y	This PCE processes job commands (such as \$CJ) that require an action to be taken on a member other than where the command was entered.
Miscellaneous (MISC)	N	This PCE is responsible for periodic functions that need to be performed in JES2. It deletes PCEs that are no longer needed, frees locks for PCEs that have ABENDED, frees jobs and SYSOUT that is on the rebuild queue, cleans up deleted dynamic PROCLIBs, and maintains the job number usage index. If this PCE is ended, then local functions performed by this PCE will cease. The cleaning of the rebuild queues and the maintenance of the job number usage index can be performed by miscellaneous PCEs on other members.
Network Path Manager (NPM)	N	This PCE manages NJE signon and routing. If this PCE is ended, then no new NJE sessions can be established and NJE routing cannot be changed. Existing NJE connections will continue to function. If network connections on other nodes start to change (sessions come up or go down), it is possible that jobs and SYSOUT could be mis-routed, resulting in jobs switching between nodes.

PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
NJE Job Receiver (NET.JR)	N	Handles Jobs being received over a line through NJE. If a job receiver is ended, then it can no longer process new jobs. Depending on the state of the device, other receivers on the same line may hang. If this is the only job receiver on the line, or if all the jobs receivers on a line have ended, then jobs will no longer be received on that line. However, if a line does not have dedicated network receivers and transmitters and the line is restarted, the ended PCE is discarded and a new PCE (if there are any available) will be used.
NJE Job Transmitter (NET.JT)	N	These PCE handle Jobs being sent out over a line through NJE. If a job transmitter is ended, then it can no longer process new jobs. Depending on the state of the device, other transmitters on the same line may hang. If this is the only job transmitter on the line, or if all the job transmitters on a line have ended, then jobs will no longer be sent on that line. However, if a line does not have dedicated network receivers and transmitters and the line and restarted, the ended PCE is discarded and a new PCE (if there are any available) will be used.
NJE SYSOUT Receiver (NET.SR)	N	These PCE handle SYSOUT being received over a line through NJE. If a SYSOUT receiver is ended, then it can no longer process new SYSOUT data sets. Depending on the state of the device, other receivers on the same line may hang. If this is the only SYSOUT receiver on the line, or if all SYSOUT receivers on the line have ended, then SYSOUT will no longer be received on that line. However, if a line does not have dedicated network receivers and transmitters and the line and restarted, the ended PCE is discarded and a new PCE (if there are any available) will be used.
NJE SYSOUT Transmitter (NET.ST)	N	These PCE handle SYSOUT being transmitted over a line through NJE. If a SYSOUT transmitter is ended, then it can no longer process new SYSOUT data sets. Depending on the state of the device, other transmitters on the same line may hang. If this is the only SYSOUT transmitter on the line, or if all SYSOUT transmitters on the line have ended, then SYSOUT will no longer be received on that line. However, if a line does not have dedicated network receivers and transmitters and the line and restarted, the ended PCE is discarded and a new PCE (if there are any available) will be used.
Offload Job Receiver (OFF.JR)	N	These PCE handle Jobs being read using SPOOL Reload. There is one job receiver per offloader (OFFLOADn). If an offload job receivers is ended, then it stops processing all jobs. Since offload receivers sequentially process records read from an offload tape, this offloader's reload process stops because the receiver has ended. Other offloaders are not affected.
Offload Job Transmitter (OFF.JT)	N	These PCEs handle jobs being written using SPOOL offload. There is one job transmitter per offloader (OFFLOADn). If an offload job receivers is ended, then it stops processing all jobs. Since there is only one transmitter per offload, jobs will no longer be written by this offloader. SYSOUT transmission is not affected. Other offloaders are not affected.



PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
Offload SYSOUT Receiver (OFF.SR)	N	These PCE handle SYSOUT being read using SPOOL Reload. There is one SYSOUT receiver per offloader (OFFLOADn). If an offload SYSOUT receiver is ended, then it stops processing all SYSOUT. Since offload receivers sequentially process records read from an offload tape, this offloader's reload process stops because the receiver has ended. Other offloaders are not affected.
Offload SYSOUT Transmitter (OFF.ST)	N	These PCEs handle SYSOUT being written using SPOOL offload. There is one SYSOUT transmitter per offloader (OFFLOADn). If an offload SYSOUT transmitter is ended, then it stops processing all SYSOUT. Since there is only one transmitter per offloader, SYSOUT will no longer be written by this offloader. Job transmission is not affected. Other offloaders are not affected.
Output Priority Aging (PRTYO)	N	This PCE updates the priority of SYSOUT on your system in accordance with the OUTDEF initialization statement. Priority aging only occurs on the lowest numbered active member of a MAS. If this PCE is ended, and this is the lowest active member, then priority aging of SYSOUT will stop. If this is not the lowest active member or is a lower numbered member is started, then there is no impact of this processor ending. JOB priority aging is not affected.
Output Processor (HOPE)	N	Creates Job Output Elements (JOEs) for jobs that have completed execution or have been received on an NJE SYSOUT receiver. If an output PCE is ended, then the work can be picked up by other output processors (including those on other members of the MAS). If all output processors are terminated, then jobs will hang in the output phase and their output cannot be printed.
Printer (PRT)	N	Each PCE of this type manages a local printer whether it is in JES or FSS mode. If a PCE of this type is ended, then that printer will stop functioning. Other printers are not affected. A \$ADD PRINTER command can be used to define a new logical JES2 printer to manage the physical printer.
Process SYSOUT Processor (PSO)	N	These PCEs handle requests made through the Process SYSOUT SSI (PSO). These requests typically are associated with TSO users (RECEIVE or OUTPUT commands, or SDSF), external writers, and applications that examine SYSOUT. When a PSO PCE is ended, then the address space the PCE was processing requests from, may be hung. If all PSO PCEs are ended, then any PSO request will result in the requesting address space being hung.
Punch (PUN)	N	Each PCE of this type manages a local punch. If a PCE of this type is ended, then that punch will stop functioning. Other punches are not affected.

PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
Purge Processor (PURGE)	N	These PCEs handle the purging of SPOOL space for JOBS and SPIN SYSOUT data sets. If one of these PCE is ended, the unit of work it was purging will hang in purge processing. Depending on the resources held by the PCE at the time it is ended, other purge processors on the same member may also hang. Purge processors on other members will not be affected and can pick up any work not hung on ended PCEs.
Reader (RDR)	N	Each PCE of this type manages a local card reader. If a PCE of this type is ended, then that card reader will stop functioning. Other card readers are not affected.
Remote Console Processor (MCON)	Y	Handles messages and commands that are being sent to RJE, NJE and other members of the MAS. This PCE manages the \$MASCOMM job.
Resource Monitor (RESOURCE)	N	This PCE is responsible for tracking resource usage and issues the \$HASP050 message if a shortage is detected. If this PCE is ended, then local resources monitored by this PCE will stop. The monitoring of MAS scope resources can be performed by resource monitor PCEs on other members.
RJE Reader (RMT.RDR)	N	Each PCE of this type manages a card reader at an RJE workstation. If a PCE of this type is ended, then that remote reader will stop functioning. Depending on the state of the device, other readers on the same remote may hang. The remote may not be able to completely logoff JES2 and could become unusable until JES2 is hot started.
RJE Printer (RMT.PRT)	N	Each PCE of this type manages a printer at an RJE workstation. If a PCE of this type is ended, then that remote printer will stop functioning. Depending on the state of the device, other printers and punches on the same remote may hang. The remote may not be able to completely logoff JES2 and could become unusable until JES2 is hot started.
RJE Punch (RMT.PUN)	N	Each PCE of this type manages a card punch at an RJE workstation. If a PCE of this type is ended, then the remote card punch will stop functioning. Depending on the state of the device, other printers and punches on the same remote may hang. The remote may not be able to completely logoff JES2 and could become unusable until JES2 is hot started.
Spool Garbage Collector (SNF)	N	This PCE is responsible for recovering SPOOL space that was not freed during normal job purge processing. If this PCE is ended, then these unowned tracks of SPOOL will not be reclaimed on this member. If there are other members, then the SPOOL management PCE on those members will perform the function.
Spool Offload I/O Manager (SOM)	N	This PCE processes asynchronous events related to the JES2 SPOOL offload facility. If this PCE is ended, then all active offload devices will eventually hang. Also, no new offload devices can be started.

PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
SWB Modify Processor (SJFSERV)	N	This PCE handles SWB modify requests for applications such as SDSF. If this PCE is ended, then SWB modify requests can not be processed. Since these requests are asynchronous, no address spaces will be delayed by this. However, since SWB changes are not being made, users of applications such as SDSF may start submitting multiple requests to JES2. These requests each consume some ECSA and if no action is taken for an extended period of time, ECSA can be exhausted.
SYSOUT API Processor (SPI)	N	These PCEs handle SAPI requests from applications. If one PCE of this type is ended, then the application whose request is currently being processed will hang. If all the SAPI PCEs are ended, then any application requesting access to SYSOUT through SAPI will eventually hang.
Spin Output Processor (SPIN)	N	These PCEs handle the processing of spin data sets created locally and those received through NJE. Not all PCEs of this type perform all functions. Only half process jobs received from NJE. If a PCE of this type ends, then the SYSOUT data sets being processed (or in the case of NJE, the job being processed) will hang. If all PCEs of this type end, then no local SYSOUT can be processed. Jobs that create spin output will complete execution but will hang in the spin phase in JES2. Also, ECSA usage can increase rapidly. The NJE function of the spin PCE will be spread across multiple members. If all the spin PCEs in the MAS capable of processing NJE SYSOUT have ended, then through NJE SYSOUT will continue to be received and none will be available for further processing.
Spool Command Processor (SPOOL)	N	This PCE handles operator commands against SPOOL volumes (\$S, \$Z, \$P). In addition it reformats SPOOL track groups that encounter I/O errors (halting SPOOL volumes if serious errors were encountered). If this PCE is ended, then no spool commands can complete (regardless of the member the command was issued on). Also, JES2 will be unable to automatically halt a SPOOL volume in the event of a serious error. If there are I/O errors on spool, then requests to handle these errors will back up the ECSA and could eventually cause ECSA to be exhausted.
SSI Status/Cancel Services (STAC)	N	These PCEs handle status and cancel SSI requests from application address spaces (such as the TSO STATUS and CANCEL commands). If a PCE of this type is ended, then any address space using the status or cancel SSI will hang.
STIMER/TTIMER Processor (TIMER)	Y	This PCE manages JES2 internal timer requests.

PCE Description/Name	Required (Yes or No)	Function
Warm Start Processor (WARM)	Y	<p>These PCEs are required during JES2 initialization but not required after initialization completes. These PCEs handle warm start processing and \$E MEMBER commands. If an abend occurs during warm start processing, JES2 will terminate. If this PCE is processing a \$E command, then the PCE will be ended. If a PCE of this type is ended, then the member it was resetting (\$Eing) will not complete reset processing. No other member can reset this member and the member can not be restarted. If all the warm start PCEs are ended, then no \$E MEMBER commands will be processed on this member. However, warm start PCEs on other members can process new reset requests.</p>

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## Appendix B. Accessibility

Accessibility features help a user who has a physical disability, such as restricted mobility or limited vision, to use software products successfully. The major accessibility features in z/OS enable users to:

- Use assistive technologies such as screen readers and screen magnifier software
- Operate specific or equivalent features using only the keyboard
- Customize display attributes such as color, contrast, and font size

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### Using assistive technologies

Assistive technology products, such as screen readers, function with the user interfaces found in z/OS. Consult the assistive technology documentation for specific information when using such products to access z/OS interfaces.

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### Keyboard navigation of the user interface

Users can access z/OS user interfaces using TSO/E or ISPF. Refer to *z/OS TSO/E Primer*, *z/OS TSO/E User's Guide*, and *z/OS ISPF User's Guide Vol I* for information about accessing TSO/E and ISPF interfaces. These guides describe how to use TSO/E and ISPF, including the use of keyboard shortcuts or function keys (PF keys). Each guide includes the default settings for the PF keys and explains how to modify their functions.
